Summary of Legislation

The bill requires changes to the wording of statewide ballot titles for initiated and referred measures. The changes are implemented in two stages, with some changes beginning in the 2012 election, and others in the following election cycle (likely 2013 or 2014, depending on when statewide measures appear on the ballot). Table 1 outlines the changes and when they take effect.

State Revenue and Expenditures

The bill is not expected to impact state revenue and expenditures for any state agency. The Office of Legislative Legal Services and the Title Board can implement the required ballot title wording for referred and initiated measures without additional cost.

Local Government Impact

To the extent that the changes to ballot wording increase the length of ballots, county clerks could incur higher costs for ballot printing and postage, especially in cases where increased length necessitates an additional page on the ballot. However, this analysis concludes that the net change to ballot length will be minimal and that likewise, any increased costs to county clerks would also be minimal.
