# A BILL FOR AN ACT CONCERNING INCREASING THE PUNISHMENT FOR LEAVING THE SCENE OF A TRAFFIC ACCIDENT THAT RESULTED IN SERIOUS BODILY INJURY TO ANY PERSON.

## **Bill Summary**

(Note: This summary applies to this bill as introduced and does not reflect any amendments that may be subsequently adopted. Under current law, a driver of any vehicle directly involved in an accident resulting in injury or worse to any person is required to remain at the scene of the accident until the driver has fulfilled certain statutory requirements. The penalty for leaving the scene of an accident resulting

in serious bodily injury to any person is increased from a class 5 felony to a class 4 felony.

1 Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Colorado: 2 **SECTION 1.** In Colorado Revised Statutes, 42-4-1601, amend 3 (1) and (2) (b) as follows: 4 42-4-1601. Accidents involving death or personal injuries -5 duties. (1) The driver of any vehicle directly involved in an accident 6 resulting in injury to, serious bodily injury to, or death of any person shall 7 immediately stop such vehicle at the scene of such accident or as close to 8 the scene as possible but OR shall immediately return to and in every 9 event THE SCENE OF THE ACCIDENT. THE DRIVER shall THEN remain at the 10 scene of the accident until the driver has fulfilled the requirements of 11 section 42-4-1603 (1). Every such stop shall be made without obstructing 12 traffic more than is necessary. 13 Any person who violates any provision of this section 14 commits: 15 (b) A class 5 CLASS 4 felony if the accident resulted in serious 16 bodily injury to any person; 17 SECTION 2. Exception to the requirements of section 2-2-703, 18 Colorado Revised Statutes. The general assembly hereby finds that the 19 amendments to section 42-4-1601, Colorado Revised Statutes, enacted in 20 section 1 of this act will result in a minor fiscal impact to the department 21 of corrections during the five years following passage of this act. Because 22 of the relative insignificance of this degree of fiscal impact, these 23 amendments are an exception to the five-year appropriation requirements 24 specified in section 2-2-703, Colorado Revised Statutes. SECTION 3. Act subject to petition - effective date. This act 25

takes effect at 12:01 a.m. on the day following the expiration of the 1 2 ninety-day period after final adjournment of the general assembly (August 3 7, 2012, if adjournment sine die is on May 9, 2012); except that, if a 4 referendum petition is filed pursuant to section 1 (3) of article V of the state constitution against this act or an item, section, or part of this act 5 6 within such period, then the act, item, section, or part will not take effect unless approved by the people at the general election to be held in 7 November 2012 and, in such case, will take effect on the date of the 8 9 official declaration of the vote thereon by the governor.
