A BILL FOR AN ACT

101 CONCERNING SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER PROGRAMS, AND, IN

102 <u>CONNECTION THEREWITH, MAKING AN APPROPRIATION.</u>

Bill Summary

(Note: This summary applies to this bill as introduced and does not reflect any amendments that may be subsequently adopted. If this bill passes third reading in the house of introduction, a bill summary that applies to the reengrossed version of this bill will be available at http://www.leg.state.co.us/billsummaries.)

The bill defines "school resource officer" and "community partners" and expressly includes school resource officers as community partners for the purposes of school safety, readiness, and incident management. The school safety resource center is required to contract the services of a full-time grant writer and to create and provide templates and guidance to school districts and schools seeking school safety funding. The school safety resource center is also required to provide suggestions concerning training for school resource officers. The school safety resource center advisory board is increased from 13 to 14 members to reflect the addition of a school resource officer.

1 *Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Colorado:* 2 **SECTION 1. Legislative declaration.** (1) The general assembly 3 hereby finds and declares that: 4 (a) School resource officers work in public safety and school 5 safety and serve as an important bridge between the two; 6 (b) School resource officers are committed to making safety for 7 all students and staff a priority in each public school in Colorado; 8 (c) As part of their mission, school resource officers are dedicated 9 to helping schools adopt, implement, review, and revise as necessary safe 10 school plans and internet safety plans; (d) School resource officers support agreements with other state 11 12 agencies where the end goal is keeping the school environment safe; and 13 (e) Schools, in conjunction with school resource officers, assess 14 overall alignment and compliance with the national incident management 15 system, create and implement an all-hazard exercise program based on the 16 national incident management system, and determine action steps to 17 achieve and maintain the goals of the national incident management 18 system. 19 (2) The general assembly further finds and declares that: 20 (a) State or regional assistance in coordinating funding strategies

for school resource officer programs would provide consistency and also
benefit school districts and schools by creating efficiencies of time and
resources; and

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(b) State technical assistance would help schools and school
 districts develop and maintain successful school resource officer
 programs.

4 SECTION 2. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 22-32-109.1, amend
5 (2) introductory portion, (4) (d) introductory portion, (4) (n), and (4) (o);
6 and add (1) (b.5), (1) (g.5), and (4) (p) as follows:

7 22-32-109.1. Board of education - specific powers and duties
8 - safe school plan - conduct and discipline code - safe school reporting
9 requirements - school response framework - school resource officers
10 - definitions. (1) Definitions. As used in this section, unless the context
11 otherwise requires:

12 (b.5) "COMMUNITY PARTNERS" MEANS, COLLECTIVELY, LOCAL 13 FIRE DEPARTMENTS, STATE AND LOCAL LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCIES, 14 LOCAL 911 AGENCIES, INTEROPERABLE COMMUNICATIONS PROVIDERS, THE 15 SAFE2TELL PROGRAM DESCRIBED IN SECTION 16-15.8-103, C.R.S., LOCAL 16 EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICE PERSONNEL, LOCAL MENTAL HEALTH 17 ORGANIZATIONS, LOCAL PUBLIC HEALTH AGENCIES, LOCAL EMERGENCY 18 MANAGEMENT PERSONNEL, LOCAL OR REGIONAL HOMELAND SECURITY 19 PERSONNEL, AND SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICERS.

(g.5) "SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER" MEANS A PEACE OFFICER, AS
DESCRIBED IN SECTION 16-2.5-101, C.R.S., WHO HAS SPECIALIZED
TRAINING, AS DESCRIBED IN SECTION 24-31-312, C.R.S., TO WORK WITH
SCHOOL STAFF AND STUDENTS AND WHO IS ASSIGNED TO A PUBLIC SCHOOL
OR CHARTER SCHOOL FOR THE PURPOSE OF CREATING A SAFE LEARNING
ENVIRONMENT AND RESPONDING TO ALL-HAZARD THREATS THAT MAY
IMPACT THE SCHOOL.

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(2) Safe school plan. In order to provide a learning environment

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1 that is safe, conducive to the learning process, and free from unnecessary 2 disruption, following consultation with the school district accountability 3 committee and school accountability committees, parents, teachers, 4 administrators, students, student councils where available, and, where 5 appropriate, the community at large, each school district board of 6 education shall adopt and implement a safe school plan, or review and 7 revise, as necessary in response to any relevant data collected by the 8 school district, any existing plans or policies already in effect. In addition 9 to the aforementioned parties, each school district board of education, in 10 adopting and implementing its safe school plan, may consult with victims 11 advocacy organizations, school psychologists, and local law enforcement 12 agencies, AND COMMUNITY PARTNERS. The plan, at a minimum, shall 13 include the following:

14 (4) School response framework - school safety, readiness, and 15 incident management plan. Each board of education shall establish a 16 school response framework that shall consist of policies described in this 17 subsection (4). By satisfying the requirements of this subsection (4), a 18 school or school district shall be in compliance with the national incident 19 management system, referred to in this subsection (4) as "NIMS", 20 developed by the federal emergency management agency. At a minimum, 21 the policies shall require:

(d) Each school district, on or before July 1, 2009, to start to
develop a school safety, readiness, and incident management plan,
including, to the extent possible, emergency communications, that
coordinates with any statewide or local emergency operation plans. In
developing the plan, a school district may collaborate with local fire
departments, state and local law enforcement agencies, local 911

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1 agencies, interoperable communications providers, the safe2tell program 2 described in section 16-15.8-103, C.R.S., local emergency medical 3 service personnel, local mental health organizations, local public health 4 agencies, local emergency management personnel, and local or regional 5 homeland security personnel, which entities are collectively referred to in 6 this subsection (4) as "community partners" COMMUNITY PARTNERS. The 7 school safety, readiness, and incident management plan shall, at a 8 minimum, identify for each public school in the school district:

9 (n) Each school district to coordinate with community partners to 10 assess overall alignment and compliance with NIMS; identify 11 requirements already met; establish a baseline for NIMS compliance; and 12 determine action steps, including developing a plan and timeline, to 13 achieve and maintain all NIMS goals; and

(o) Each school district to develop a timeline and strategy for
compliance with the requirements of this subsection (4) and to
strategically plan, schedule, and conduct all activities with community
partners; AND

(p) School resource officers to be familiar with the
school response framework outlined in this subsection (4), the
all-hazard exercise program, and the interoperable
communications of the school to which he or she is assigned.

SECTION 3. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 24-33.5-1213.4,
amend (1) as follows:

24 24-33.5-1213.4. School all-hazard emergency planning and
25 response. (1) The school response framework created in section
26 22-32-109.1 (4), C.R.S., sets forth the framework for school emergency
27 incident response and emergency preparedness, including emergency

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1 communications AND THE RESPONSIBILITIES OF SCHOOL RESOURCE 2 OFFICERS. Pursuant to the school response framework, emergency 3 response personnel are community partners with schools. As part of its 4 duty to regularly inspect school buildings to ensure compliance with the 5 fire code, the division, local fire departments, and certified fire inspectors 6 may partner with schools in assessing each school's implementation of 7 NIMS, and the interoperability of the school's emergency 8 communications equipment with state and local emergency response 9 agencies, AND THE IMPLEMENTATION OF A SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER 10 PROGRAM. 11 **SECTION 4.** In Colorado Revised Statutes, 24-33.5-1801,

12 **amend** (2) (a) as follows:

13 24-33.5-1801. Legislative declaration. (2) The general assembly
14 further finds that:

(a) The most appropriate way to prevent and prepare for acts of
violence and other emergencies that may occur on school campuses is to
foster a cooperative effort by schools, SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICERS, law
enforcement agencies, emergency responders, behavioral health experts,
parents, and community members to identify, gather, and apply the
necessary resources; and

21 SECTION 5. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 24-33.5-1803, add
22 (3) (i), (3) (j), and (3) (k) as follows:

23 24-33.5-1803. School safety resource center - created - <u>duties</u>
 24 <u>- repeal.</u> (3) The center has the following duties:

25 (i) (I) TO HIRE OR CONTRACT FOR THE SERVICES OF AN EMERGENCY
 26 <u>RESPONSE CONSULTANT WITH EXPERIENCE IN LAW ENFORCEMENT AND</u>
 27 SCHOOL SAFETY TO PROVIDE GUIDANCE FOR SCHOOLS, SCHOOL RESOURCE

1 OFFICERS, AND OTHER COMMUNITY PARTNERS FOR SCHOOL BUILDING 2 SAFETY ASSESSMENTS AND THE USE OF BEST PRACTICES FOR SCHOOL 3 SECURITY, EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS AND RESPONSE, INTEROPERABLE 4 COMMUNICATIONS, AND OTHER PROVISIONS OF THE SCHOOL RESPONSE 5 FRAMEWORK. THE EMERGENCY RESPONSE OUTREACH CONSULTANT SHALL 6 ALSO WORK WITH THE CENTER DIRECTOR AND SCHOOL OUTREACH 7 CONSULTANT TO RESEARCH GRANT OPPORTUNITIES AND PROVIDE 8 ASSISTANCE TO SCHOOLS SEEKING GRANTS FOR SCHOOL SAFETY AND 9 EMERGENCY RESPONSE ASSISTANCE. 10 (II) THIS PARAGRAPH (i) IS REPEALED, EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2018. 11 (i) TO PROVIDE INFORMATION AND RESOURCES RELATING TO THE

12 DEVELOPMENT AND MAINTENANCE OF SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER 13 PROGRAMS, AS DETERMINED BY THE CENTER, TO THE DIVISION OF FIRE 14 PREVENTION AND CONTROL IN THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SAFETY FOR 15 DISTRIBUTION TO SCHOOL DISTRICTS AND SCHOOLS PURSUANT TO SECTION 16 24-33.5-1213.4 AND TO LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCIES AND OTHER 17 COMMUNITY PARTNERS, AS DESCRIBED IN SECTION 22-32-109.1, C.R.S.; 18 AND

SECTION 6. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 24-33.5-1804,
amend (2) (a) introductory portion; and add (2) (a) (XIV) as follows:

24 24-33.5-1804. School safety resource center advisory board 25 created - repeal. (2) (a) The advisory board shall consist of not less than
 26 thirteen FOURTEEN members, each of whom shall be appointed to a term
 27 of two years as follows:

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(XIV) ONE MEMBER MUST BE A SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER, AS
 DEFINED IN SECTION 22-32-109.1 (1), C.R.S., AND BE APPOINTED BY THE
 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR IN CONSULTATION WITH A STATEWIDE ASSOCIATION
 REPRESENTING SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICERS.

5 SECTION 7. Appropriation. In addition to any other 6 appropriation, there is hereby appropriated, out of any moneys in the 7 general fund not otherwise appropriated, to the department of public 8 safety, for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2013, the sum of \$57,815 and 9 1.0 FTE, or so much thereof as may be necessary, for allocation to the 10 school safety resource center related to the implementation of this act. 11 SECTION 8. Safety clause. The general assembly hereby finds, 12 determines, and declares that this act is necessary for the immediate 13 preservation of the public peace, health, and safety.
