A BILL FOR AN ACT 101 CONCERNING STATEWIDE ALL-HAZARDS RESOURCE MOBILIZATION, 102 AND, IN CONNECTION THEREWITH, CLARIFYING THE POWERS 103 AND DUTIES OF THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SAFETY WITH 104 RESPECT TO THE STATEWIDE ALL-HAZARDS RESOURCE 105 MOBILIZATION PLAN AND SPECIFYING HOW MOBILIZED ENTITIES 106 RECEIVE REIMBURSEMENT FOR EXPENSES INCURRED BY 107 RENDERING ASSISTANCE.

Bill Summary

(Note: This summary applies to this bill as introduced and does not reflect any amendments that may be subsequently adopted. If this bill passes third reading in the house of introduction, a bill summary that applies to the reengrossed version of this bill will be available at Lower North Fork Wildfire Commission. Currently, the office of emergency management (office) in the division of homeland security and emergency management (division) in the department of public safety (department) is charged with developing a statewide all-hazards resource mobilization plan (plan) to facilitate the interjurisdictional provision of disaster emergency assistance during disasters. The bill clarifies the duties of the office, the director of the office, and executive director of the department with respect to such plan and establishes the means by which mobilized governmental entities may seek reimbursement for costs incurred by rendering interjurisdictional disaster assistance.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Colorado:

2 SECTION 1. In Colorado Revised Statutes, amend

24-33.5-705.4 as follows:

24-33.5-705.4. All-hazards resource mobilization system - creation - plan - duties - reimbursement for expenses incurred by mobilized entities - eligibility - definitions - legislative declaration.

(1) (a) The office of emergency management shall prepare a statewide resource mobilization system to provide for the allocation and deployment of resources in the event of a disaster or local incident that requires more resources than those available under any existing interjurisdictional or mutual aid agreement The general assembly Hereby Finds, determines, and declares that the statewide all-hazards resource mobilization system, which provides for efficient mobilizing, tracking, allocating, and demobilizing emergency resources and ensures that a requesting unit of government receives proper equipment and qualified personnel, is necessary to provide resources to any emergency incident beyond local capabilities and thus necessary to protect life,

PROPERTY, THE ENVIRONMENT, AND CULTURAL AND ECONOMIC

1	RESOURCES. THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY FURTHER FINDS AND DECLARES
2	THAT THE NEED TO ENSURE THAT THE STATE IS ADEQUATELY PREPARED
3	AND ABLE TO ADDRESS LARGE-SCALE EMERGENCIES AND DISASTERS
4	REQUIRES A MECHANISM TO REIMBURSE STATE AGENCIES, TRIBAL
5	GOVERNMENTS, AND LOCAL JURISDICTIONS THAT RESPOND TO REQUESTS
6	FOR HELP FROM OTHER JURISDICTIONS IN TIMES OF NEED. IT IS THEREFORE
7	NECESSARY TO:
8	(I) FORMULATE THE POLICY AND ORGANIZATIONAL STRUCTURE
9	FOR LARGE-SCALE MOBILIZATION OF EMERGENCY RESOURCES IN THE
10	STATE THROUGH CREATION OF A STATEWIDE ALL-HAZARDS RESOURCE
11	MOBILIZATION SYSTEM;
12	(II) ESTABLISH THE MEANS BY WHICH STATE AGENCIES AND
13	TRIBAL AND LOCAL JURISDICTIONS MAY BE REIMBURSED FOR EXPENSES
14	THEY INCUR WHEN MOBILIZED BY THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR PURSUANT TO
15	THE MOBILIZATION PLAN; AND
16	(III) PROVIDE A PROCEDURE TO REIMBURSE A HOST JURISDICTION
17	WHEN IT HAS EXHAUSTED OR WILL EXHAUST ALL OF ITS OWN RESOURCES
18	AND THE RESOURCES OF ITS LOCAL MUTUAL AID NETWORK AVAILABLE
19	UNDER A MUTUAL AID OR INTERJURISDICTIONAL AGREEMENT.
20	(b) In accordance with section 24-33.5-713, it is the intent
21	OF THE LEGISLATURE TO ENCOURAGE POLITICAL SUBDIVISIONS TO ENTER
22	INTO MUTUAL AID AND OTHER INTERJURISDICTIONAL AGREEMENTS. SUCH
23	AGREEMENTS PRODUCE ENHANCED EMERGENCY RESPONSE AND ARE THUS
24	ESSENTIAL TO PROTECTING THE PUBLIC PEACE, SAFETY, HEALTH, AND
25	WELFARE, INCLUDING THE LIVES AND PROPERTY, OF THE PEOPLE OF THE
26	STATE OF COLORADO.
27	(2) The resource mobilization system created pursuant to

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subsection (1) of this section shall be developed in coordination with appropriate federal, tribal, state, local government, and private sector agencies and organizations. The system shall include mobilization procedures and may include provisions for reimbursement of costs. As USED IN THIS SECTION, UNLESS THE CONTEXT OTHERWISE REQUIRES:

- (a) "DIRECTOR" MEANS THE DIRECTOR OF THE OFFICE OF EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT CREATED IN SECTION 24-33.5-705.
- 8 (b) "EMERGENCY MANAGER" MEANS THE DIRECTOR OR
 9 COORDINATOR OF THE LOCAL OR INTERJURISDICTIONAL DISASTER AGENCY,
 10 AS DESCRIBED IN SECTION 24-33.5-707 (4), OR OTHER PERSON, IDENTIFIED
 11 PURSUANT TO SECTION 24-33.5-707 (6), RESPONSIBLE FOR LOCAL OR
 12 INTERJURISDICTIONAL DISASTER PREPAREDNESS AND RESPONSE.
 - (c) "HOST JURISDICTION" MEANS THE JURISDICTION HAVING AUTHORITY OVER THE DISASTER OR EMERGENCY.
- 15 (d) "INCIDENT COMMAND SYSTEM" HAS THE MEANING SET FORTH
 16 IN SECTION 29-22.5-102 (3), C.R.S.
 - (e) "JURISDICTION" MEANS STATE AND TRIBAL AUTHORITIES AND COUNTY, CITY, CITY AND COUNTY, TOWN, SPECIAL DISTRICT, OR OTHER POLITICAL SUBDIVISIONS OF THE STATE.
 - (f) "MOBILIZATION" MEANS THE PROCESS OF PROVIDING, UPON REQUEST AND SUBJECT TO AVAILABILITY, EMERGENCY RESOURCES BEYOND THOSE AVAILABLE THROUGH EXISTING INTERJURISDICTIONAL OR MUTUAL AID AGREEMENTS IN RESPONSE TO A REQUEST FROM A JURISDICTION IN WHICH AN EMERGENCY OR DISASTER SITUATION OR LOCAL EMERGENCY INCIDENT THAT HAS EXCEEDED OR WILL EXCEED THE CAPABILITIES OF AVAILABLE LOCAL RESOURCES. THE TERM INCLUDES THE REDISTRIBUTION OF RESOURCES EITHER TO DIRECT EMERGENCY INCIDENT

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1	ASSIGNMENTS OR TO ASSIGNMENT IN COMMUNITIES WHERE RESOURCES
2	ARE NEEDED TO PROVIDE COVERAGE WHEN THOSE COMMUNITIES'
3	RESOURCES HAVE BEEN MOBILIZED TO ASSIST OTHER JURISDICTIONS.
4	(g) "MOBILIZATION PLAN" MEANS THE STATEWIDE ALL-HAZARDS
5	RESOURCE MOBILIZATION PLAN DEVELOPED AND UTILIZED PURSUANT TO
6	THIS SECTION.
7	(h) "Mobilization system" means the statewide
8	ALL-HAZARDS RESOURCE MOBILIZATION SYSTEM CREATED UNDER THIS
9	SECTION, WHICH SYSTEM INCLUDES THE MOBILIZATION PLAN AND THE
10	TECHNOLOGY AND PERSONNEL NECESSARY TO MOBILIZE RESOURCES
11	ACCORDING TO THE PLAN.
12	(i) "MUTUAL AID" MEANS EMERGENCY INTERAGENCY ASSISTANCE
13	RENDERED PURSUANT TO AN AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE JURISDICTIONS
14	RENDERING AND RECEIVING ASSISTANCE.
15	(j) "NONHOST JURISDICTION" MEANS A JURISDICTION PROVIDING
16	DISASTER OR EMERGENCY RESPONSE RESOURCES TO A HOST JURISDICTION.
17	(k) "Unified command" has the meaning set forth in section
18	29-22.5-102 (8), C.R.S.
19	(3) Powers and duties. (a) The director shall develop and
20	MAINTAIN A STATEWIDE ALL-HAZARDS RESOURCE MOBILIZATION PLAN
21	THAT SETS FORTH PROCEDURES FOR MOBILIZATION, ALLOCATION,
22	DEPLOYMENT, COORDINATION, TRACKING, COST ACCOUNTING, AND
23	DEMOBILIZATION OF RESOURCES DURING DISASTERS AND OTHER
24	LARGE-SCALE EMERGENCIES AND LOCAL INCIDENTS THAT REQUIRE MORE
25	RESOURCES THAN THOSE AVAILABLE UNDER ANY EXISTING
26	INTERJURISDICTIONAL OR MUTUAL AID AGREEMENT. IN DEVELOPING THE
27	MOBILIZATION PLAN, THE DIRECTOR SHALL CONSULT WITH AND SOLICIT

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1	RECOMMENDATIONS FROM THE HOMELAND SECURITY AND ALL-HAZARDS
2	SENIOR ADVISORY COMMITTEE CREATED IN SECTION 24-33.5-1614 AND
3	OTHER APPROPRIATE REPRESENTATIVES OF STATE, TRIBAL, AND LOCAL
4	GOVERNMENTAL AND PRIVATE SECTOR EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT
5	ORGANIZATIONS. THE DIRECTOR SHALL ENSURE THAT THE MOBILIZATION
6	PLAN IS CONSISTENT WITH, AND INCORPORATED INTO, THE COLORADO
7	STATE EMERGENCY OPERATIONS PLAN.
8	(b) The executive director, or his or her designee, is
9	RESPONSIBLE FOR MOBILIZING RESOURCES FROM STATE AND NONHOST
10	JURISDICTIONS, IN ACCORDANCE WITH THIS SECTION AND THE
11	MOBILIZATION PLAN, WHEN THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR OR HIS OR HER
12	DESIGNEE DETERMINES IT IS NECESSARY TO DO SO TO PROTECT LIFE,
13	PROPERTY, THE ENVIRONMENT, AND CULTURAL AND ECONOMIC
14	RESOURCES.
15	(c) The director, or his or her designee, shall serve as
16	STATE RESOURCE COORDINATOR WHEN THE MOBILIZATION PLAN IS
17	IMPLEMENTED.
18	(4) Mobilization. (a) (I) The executive director, or his or
19	HER DESIGNEE, MAY ORDER MOBILIZATION PURSUANT TO THIS SECTION
20	ONLY IF HE OR SHE RECEIVES A REQUEST TO DO SO FROM THE GOVERNOR
21	OR FROM AN EMERGENCY MANAGER.
22	(II) AN EMERGENCY MANAGER MAY REQUEST MOBILIZATION ONLY
23	IF THE REQUEST IS IN RESPONSE TO A LARGE-SCALE EMERGENCY,
24	DISASTER, OR OTHER LOCAL INCIDENT THAT EXCEEDS OR WILL EXCEED THE
25	CAPABILITIES OF AVAILABLE LOCAL RESOURCES AND THOSE RESOURCES
26	AVAILABLE THROUGH EXISTING MUTUAL AID AGREEMENTS.
27	(III) UPON RECEIVING A REQUEST FOR MOBILIZATION AND FINDING

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1	THAT THE LOCAL JURISDICTION HAS EXHAUSTED OR WILL EXHAUST ALL
2	AVAILABLE RESOURCES, THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR OR HIS OR HER
3	DESIGNEE SHALL DETERMINE WHETHER MOBILIZATION IS THE APPROPRIATE
4	RESPONSE TO THE EMERGENCY OR DISASTER. IF SO, THE EXECUTIVE
5	DIRECTOR SHALL MOBILIZE NONHOST JURISDICTIONS UNDER THE
6	MOBILIZATION PLAN.
7	(b) Upon and for the duration of mobilization:
8	(I) THE STATE RESOURCE COORDINATOR AND ASSIGNED STAFF
9	SHALL SERVE JOINTLY WITH THE COMMANDER OF THE HOST JURISDICTION'S
10	DISASTER AGENCY UNDER UNIFIED COMMAND TO COMMAND THE
11	MOBILIZATION EFFORT CONSISTENT WITH THE INCIDENT COMMAND
12	SYSTEM AND MOBILIZATION PLAN AND PROCEDURES;
13	(II) All resources, including those of the host jurisdiction
14	AND THOSE OF NONHOST JURISDICTIONS THAT RESPONDED EARLIER UNDER
15	AN EXISTING INTERJURISDICTIONAL OR MUTUAL AID OR OTHER
16	AGREEMENT, MUST BE MOBILIZED;

(III)

RESOURCE COORDINATOR AND THE COMMANDER OF THE HOST JURISDICTION AND SHALL BE ADMINISTERED CONSISTENT WITH THE MOBILIZATION PLAN AND INCIDENT COMMAND SYSTEM PROCEDURES; AND (IV) Any Limits on or exemption from Liability to which the Jurisdictions providing resources in response to a mobilization effected under this section are entitled under LAW apply as though the Jurisdictions were operating under their normal statutory authorities within their jurisdictional boundaries.

3	WHEN MOBILIZATION IS NO LONGER REQUIRED AND, AT THAT TIME, SHALL
4	DECLARE THE END TO THE MOBILIZATION.
5	(5) Reimbursement. (a) The director, in consultation with
6	THE OFFICE OF STATE PLANNING AND BUDGETING CREATED IN SECTION
7	24-37-102, SHALL DEVELOP PROCEDURES TO FACILITATE REIMBURSEMENT
8	TO STATE AGENCIES AND JURISDICTIONS FROM APPROPRIATE FEDERAL AND
9	STATE FUNDS WHEN STATE AGENCIES AND JURISDICTIONS ARE MOBILIZED
10	BY THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR PURSUANT TO THE MOBILIZATION PLAN. THE
11	DIRECTOR SHALL ENSURE THAT THESE PROCEDURES PROVIDE
12	REIMBURSEMENT IN AS TIMELY A MANNER AS POSSIBLE.
13	(b) (I) IN ORDER TO BE ELIGIBLE FOR SUPPORT UNDER THE
14	MOBILIZATION PLAN, A JURISDICTION MUST BE PARTICIPATING IN AN
15	INTERJURISDICTIONAL OR MUTUAL AID AGREEMENT ENTERED INTO
16	PURSUANT TO THIS PART 7.
17	(II) ALL MOBILIZED NONHOST JURISDICTIONS ARE ELIGIBLE FOR
18	EXPENSE REIMBURSEMENT FROM THE TIME OF THE MOBILIZATION
19	DECLARATION THROUGH DEMOBILIZATION.
20	(6) (a) Nothing in this section limits the powers of the
21	GOVERNOR DURING A DISASTER UNDER 24-33.5-704.
22	(b) EXCEPT AS EXPRESSLY PROVIDED IN THIS SECTION, NOTHING IN
23	THIS SECTION LIMITS THE ELIGIBILITY OF ANY NONHOST JURISDICTION FOR
24	REIMBURSEMENT OF EXPENSES INCURRED IN PROVIDING RESOURCES FOR
25	MOBILIZATION.
26	(c) Nothing in this section precludes a state or local
27	COVEDNMENTAL ENTITY FROM SEEKING DURI IC ASSISTANCE FUNDING

4	SECTION 2. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 24-33.5-713, amend
5	(1) as follows:
6	24-33.5-713. Mutual aid. (1) THE OFFICE OF EMERGENCY
7	MANAGEMENT SHALL ENCOURAGE AND ASSIST political subdivisions not
8	participating in interjurisdictional arrangements pursuant to this part 7
9	nevertheless shall be encouraged and assisted by the office of emergency
10	management to conclude ENTER INTO suitable arrangements for furnishing
11	mutual aid in coping with disasters. The arrangements shall MUST include
12	provision of aid by persons and units in public employ AND, WHENEVER
13	POSSIBLE, SHOULD BE WRITTEN WITHOUT STATED LIMITATIONS AS TO
14	RESOURCES AVAILABLE, TIME, OR AREA.
15	SECTION 3. Safety clause. The general assembly hereby finds,
16	determines, and declares that this act is necessary for the immediate
17	preservation of the public peace, health, and safety.

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
