**Summary of Legislation**

This bill conforms retail marijuana licensing law with medical marijuana law by allowing a local jurisdiction to submit fingerprints to the Colorado Bureau of Investigation (CBI) in the Department of Public Safety (DPS) for the purpose of conducting fingerprint-based criminal history record checks for an individual applying for a retail marijuana establishment license. If the individual's fingerprints are unclassifiable, the local jurisdiction may acquire a name-based criminal history check.

**State Revenue**

This bill is expected to result in a minimal increase in cash fund revenue to the CBI Identification Unit Fund in DPS from fees for fingerprint-based criminal background checks. Given that few local jurisdictions allow retail marijuana establishments and that many retail licensees are already subject to the background checks for medical marijuana licensing, the fiscal note assumes that the bill will result in a minimal increase in the number of fingerprint-based criminal background checks.

**State Expenditures**

The minimal increase in revenue noted above corresponds to a minimal increase in expenditures for fingerprint-based criminal background checks. The DPS receives an annual appropriation for this purpose, so no new appropriation is required.

**Local Government Impact**

Local jurisdictions that choose to require their own fingerprint-based criminal background checks for applicants for retail marijuana establishment licenses, will see an increase in expenditures for those checks. These are expected to be minimal and may be recovered from the individuals subject to the checks.

**Effective Date**

The bill was signed into law by the Governor and took effect on March 17, 2014.
