Summary of Legislation

Under current law, if a board of county commissioners adopts a resolution for the control and licensing of dogs and other pet animals, the county may only issue a dog permit or license if the owner of the dog provides a valid rabies vaccination certificate. This bill clarifies that the rabies vaccination requirement for licensing also applies to cats and ferrets.

Local Government Impact

Local governments that currently license cats and ferrets, but do not require proof of rabies immunization may experience a minimal workload increase to modify licensing processes.

The bill is not likely to impact the revenue of local governments because it provides clarification that cats and ferrets are to be vaccinated for rabies before receiving a license. The bill does not require that cats and ferrets be licensed, and therefore, does not change the number of animals being licensed or the counties choosing to license pet animals.

Effective Date

The bill takes effect August 6, 2014, if the General Assembly adjourns on May 7, 2014, as scheduled, and no referendum petition is filed.
