101 CONCERNING PERSONAL BELIEF EXEMPTIONS TO IMMUNIZATION

102 **REQUIREMENTS FOR CHILDREN PRIOR TO ATTENDING SCHOOL.**

Bill Summary

(Note: This summary applies to this bill as introduced and does not reflect any amendments that may be subsequently adopted. When a parent, guardian, emancipated student, or student 18 years of age or older has a personal belief that is opposed to immunizations, the bill requires the person to submit to the student's school a statement of exemption that includes:

! The signature of a health care provider or an authorized

representative of the department of public health and environment (department) or of a county, district, or municipal public health agency who is permitted and qualified to administer vaccines stating that the parent, guardian, or student received information disclosing the benefits and risks of immunizations to the student and the community; or

! A certificate of completion of an on-line education module developed by the infant immunization program at the department that discloses the benefits and risks of immunization to the student and the community.

The bill also requires the department to promulgate rules concerning student immunizations.

1 Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Colorado:

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SECTION 1. Legislative declaration. (1) The general assembly hereby finds and declares:

4 (a) Vaccines are considered one of the greatest public health
5 achievements of the twentieth century, and save an estimated three
6 million children's lives every year;

- 7 (b) Vaccines are cost-effective, and for every dollar we spend
 8 immunizing a child up to six years of age, more than \$10 is saved in
 9 direct and indirect costs;
- 10 (c) High rates of immunization coverage are necessary to prevent
 11 the spread of vaccine-preventable diseases;
- (d) Children who are not vaccinated are twenty-two to
 twenty-eight times more likely to get pertussis (whooping cough) than
 their immunized peers, and with Colorado pertussis cases at epidemic
 levels, high exemption rates can increase the risk of pertussis and other
 vaccine-preventable diseases within Colorado schools and communities;
- (e) Personal belief exemptions are the primary reason forexemption from recommended vaccines and account for over ninety

1 percent of all exemptions for Colorado kindergartners from 2003-2012;

2 (f) Colorado has one of the highest rates of personal belief
3 exemption for immunizations in the United States, which translates to
4 nearly three thousand kindergartners entering school unvaccinated against
5 one or more vaccine-preventable diseases each year;

6 (g) States with permissive or easy procedures for claiming 7 personal belief exemptions have higher rates of vaccine-preventable 8 diseases; states with policies that make it easy to exempt children from 9 immunization were associated with a ninety percent higher incidence of 10 whooping cough in 2011; and

(h) A parent's decision to refuse vaccination for their child carries
risk for their child and the community at large and, therefore, it is critical
that Colorado develop a policy that ensures careful consideration of the
research about vaccine benefits and risks.

15 SECTION 2. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 25-4-902, add (6) as
16 follows:

17 25-4-902. Immunization prior to attending school 18 standardized immunization information. (6) THE DEPARTMENT OF
19 EDUCATION SHALL DEVELOP A PLAN TO ENSURE THAT SCHOOLS COMPLY
20 WITH THIS SECTION.

SECTION 3. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 25-4-903, amend (2)
introductory portion and (2) (b); and add (2) (c), (2) (d), and (5) as
follows:

24 25-4-903. Exemptions from immunization - rules. (2) It is the
25 responsibility of the parent or legal guardian to have his or her child
26 immunized unless the child is exempted pursuant to this section. A
27 student shall be IS exempted from receiving the required immunizations

1 in the following manner:

(b) By submitting to the student's school a statement of exemption
signed by one parent or guardian, or the emancipated student, or student
eighteen years of age or older that the parent, guardian, or student is an
adherent to a religious belief whose teachings are opposed to
immunizations; or that the parent or guardian, or the emancipated student,
or student eighteen years of age or older has a personal belief that is
opposed to immunizations: OR

9 (c) BY SUBMITTING TO THE STUDENT'S SCHOOL A STATEMENT OF 10 EXEMPTION SIGNED BY ONE PARENT OR GUARDIAN, EMANCIPATED 11 STUDENT, OR STUDENT EIGHTEEN YEARS OF AGE OR OLDER THAT THE 12 PARENT, GUARDIAN, OR STUDENT HAS A PERSONAL BELIEF THAT IS 13 OPPOSED TO IMMUNIZATIONS. THE STATEMENT OF EXEMPTION MUST 14 INCLUDE OR BE ACCOMPANIED BY:

15 (I) THE SIGNATURE OF A PHYSICIAN; A PHYSICIAN ASSISTANT; AN 16 ADVANCED PRACTICE NURSE; OR AN AUTHORIZED REPRESENTATIVE OF THE 17 DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH AND ENVIRONMENT OR OF A COUNTY, 18 DISTRICT, OR MUNICIPAL PUBLIC HEALTH AGENCY WHO IS PERMITTED AND 19 QUALIFIED TO ADMINISTER VACCINES ON A WRITTEN DISCLOSURE STATING 20 THAT THE PARENT, GUARDIAN, OR STUDENT RECEIVED INFORMATION 21 DISCLOSING THE BENEFITS AND RISKS OF IMMUNIZATIONS TO THE STUDENT 22 AND THE COMMUNITY; OR

(II) A CERTIFICATE OF COMPLETION OF AN ON-LINE EDUCATION
MODULE DEVELOPED BY THE INFANT IMMUNIZATION PROGRAM AT THE
DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH AND ENVIRONMENT THAT DISCLOSES THE
BENEFITS AND RISKS OF IMMUNIZATION TO THE STUDENT AND THE
COMMUNITY.

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(d) THE STATE BOARD OF HEALTH SHALL PROMULGATE RULES
 REGARDING:

3 (I) THE CONTENT OF THE REQUIRED DISCLOSURES, INCLUDING
4 EVIDENCE-BASED RESEARCH, RESOURCES AND INFORMATION FROM
5 CREDIBLE SCIENTIFIC AND PUBLIC HEALTH ORGANIZATIONS, AND
6 PEER-REVIEWED STUDIES; AND

7 (II) THE FREQUENCY OF RECEIVING DISCLOSURES AND THE8 SUBMISSION OF EXEMPTION FORMS.

9 (5) EACH SCHOOL SHALL MAKE THE IMMUNIZATION AND
10 EXEMPTION RATES OF THEIR ENROLLED STUDENT POPULATION PUBLICLY
11 AVAILABLE.

SECTION 4. In Colorado Revised Statutes, add 25-4-910 as
follows:

14 25-4-910. Immunization data collection. The DEPARTMENT OF
15 PUBLIC HEALTH AND ENVIRONMENT, IN CONSULTATION WITH THE
16 DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION AND THE DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN SERVICES,
17 SHALL ESTABLISH A JOINT POLICY ON IMMUNIZATION DATA COLLECTION
18 AND SHARING.

SECTION 5. Effective date. This act takes effect July 1, 2015.
 SECTION 6. Safety clause. The general assembly hereby finds,
 determines, and declares that this act is necessary for the immediate
 preservation of the public peace, health, and safety.

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
