Summary of Legislation

This bill provides for cost sharing for salaries of entry level deputy district attorneys (DDA) provided certain conditions are met. To be eligible for state moneys to fund entry level DDA salaries, the county or counties within a particular judicial district must provide a minimum annual salary of \$55,608 per DDA. The bill defines an entry level DDA as someone with less than five years of prosecution experience.

For judicial districts with less than 225,000 residents that provide entry level DDAs with the minimum salary, the state share of salary costs is 20 percent. For judicial districts with more than 225,000 residents that provide DDAs with the minimum salary, the state share of salary costs is 10 percent. Beginning in January 2016, and every fourth legislative session thereafter, the Judiciary committees of the General Assembly are to review the compensation of DDAs and make recommendations as appropriate.

The bill also appropriates \$350,000 per year to the Colorado District Attorneys' Council (CDAC) to provide prosecution training, seminars, and continuing education programs to its members.

Background

There are 22 judicial districts in Colorado. The 1st, 2nd, 8th, 17th, 18th, and 20th judicial districts provide salaries above the minimum amount. There are no entry level DDAs in the 7th judicial district. Table 1, below, shows the population and funding status of each judicial district.

State Expenditures

Beginning in FY 2014-15, this bill increases state General Fund expenditures by at least \$1.1 million per year. Of this amount, \$350,000 is allocated to the CDAC and \$744,523 is allocated to the 1st, 2nd, 8th, 17th, 18th, and 20th judicial districts. Additional costs may be incurred under the bill, conditional upon whether any or all of the remaining judicial districts take action to officially raise the minimum salary for entry level DDAs.

Assumptions. The fiscal note assumes that any judicial district that currently pays the minimum salary will receive either 10 percent or 20 percent of actual salary costs (depending on the size of the judicial district) for all entry level DDAs. For any judicial district that does not currently meet the minimum salary requirement, costs are assumed to be conditional. Conditional costs assume a judicial district would increase salaries to the minimum level prior to receiving a state match of either 10 percent or 20 percent. Table 2 shows the required and conditional costs under the bill.

Local Government Impact

Overall, the local government impact varies by judicial district. For certain judicial districts, costs are reduced. In one judicial district, the fiscal impact depends on it hiring one or more entry level DDAs. For other judicial districts, the official minimum salary and the local share must be increased in order to receive a state match. In some cases, the amount of the increase is minimal and more than offset by the receipt of state matching funds.

Reductions in costs. As shown in Table 2, above, for the 1st, 2nd, 8th, 17th, 18th, and 20th judicial districts, current costs will be reduced by a total of \$744,523.

Conditional impact for hiring an entry level DDA. Because there are no entry level DDAs in the 7th judicial district, this bill does not currently affect it. If the 7th judicial district opts to hire an entry level DDA, the fiscal impact will depend on the minimum salary it sets. If it opts to hire someone at or above the suggested minimum salary, it will receive a 20 percent match from the state.

Cost increases. For several judicial districts, costs must first increase and the judicial district must officially adopt the minimum salary of \$55,608 for an entry level DDA in order to be eligible for a state match. In many districts, the increase in local costs would be offset by an increase in state matching funds. Tables 1 and 2, above, show the amount of increased local contributions required to receive state matching funds.

Effective Date

The bill takes effect upon signature of the Governor, or upon becoming law without his signature.

State Appropriations

For FY 2014-15, the following General Fund appropriations are required:

- \$350,000 for the Colorado District Attorneys Council;
- \$118,650 to the 1st judicial district;
- \$147,103 to the 2nd judicial district;
- \$44,800 to the 8th judicial district;
- \$194,198 to the 17th judicial district;
- \$182,400 to the 18th judicial district; and
- \$57,372 to the 20th judicial district.
