Summary of Legislation

This bill designates the **Palisade** peach as the official state fruit of Colorado.

State Expenditures

This bill increases cash fund expenditures by \$1,100 and will increase state agency workload by a minimal amount. The Legislature publishes brochures that are made available to people visiting the State Capitol. Once the existing supply of brochures is exhausted, Legislative Council staff will redesign the state symbols and emblems brochure to include the newly designated state fruit. A state plaque recognizing the **Palisade** peach as the official state fruit will also be installed with other plaques honoring state symbols and emblems in the exhibition area of Mr. Brown's attic. Design and plaque costs are anticipated to total \$1,100 and will be paid from the Capitol Building Advisory Committee account within the Public Buildings Trust Fund.

Other costs. The addition of new state symbols, such as the one proposed by this bill, will eventually require a redesign of the State Capitol brochure, at a cost estimated to be between \$2,500 and \$5,100. This cost is not considered to be directly related to this bill, but rather is a cumulative effect from various bills addressing new state symbols. Any costs for redesigning the brochure will be addressed through the annual budget process.

Other state agencies. The Colorado State Archives is required to obtain a photo of the **Palisade** peach and place it on their website. The Colorado State Archives must also attend a meeting of the State Emblems and Symbols Committee. This work can be accomplished within the normal course of business and no new appropriations are needed.

Effective Date

The bill takes effect August 6, 2014, if the General Assembly adjourns on May 7, 2014, as scheduled, and no referendum petition is filed.

State Appropriations

For FY 2014-15, the Legislative Branch requires an appropriation of \$1,100 from the Capitol Building Advisory Committee account with the Public Buildings Trust Fund.
