#### **Summary of Legislation**

**Recommended by the Joint Budget Committee**, this bill eliminates the annual transfer of \$2 million from the Prevention, Early Detection, and Treatment Fund to the Department of Health Care Policy and Financing (HCPF) for Medicaid disease management and treatment programs.

### **Background**

The Prevention, Early Detection, and Treatment Fund receives 16 percent of the revenues collected from Amendment 35 cigarette and tobacco taxes. The majority of the fund's revenues are appropriated to the Cancer, Cardiovascular Disease, and Chronic Pulmonary Disease Prevention, Early Detection, and Treatment Program in the Department of Public Health and Environment (DPHE).

The \$2 million annual transfer to the HCPF was established under Senate Bill 13-232, but no Medicaid disease management and treatment programs have been created.

#### **State Revenue**

This bill does not alter state revenue, but eliminates a \$2 million annual transfer from the Prevention, Early Detection, and Treatment Fund to HCPF beginning in FY 2014-15.

#### **State Expenditures**

This bill does not alter the amount of state expenditures, but changes which department may use moneys from the Prevention, Early Detection, and Treatment Fund. Under SB14-109, no moneys will be transferred from this fund to the HCPF. All moneys in the fund will be retained by the DPHE.

#### **State Appropriations**

The fiscal note assumes the impact of SB14-109 will be included in the FY 2014-15 Long Bill. If this does not occur, the DPHE requires an appropriation of \$2 million from the Prevention, Early Detection, and Treatment Fund

#### **Effective Date**

The bill takes effect July 1, 2014.
