SENATE JOINT MEMORIAL 14-005	
CONCERNING MEMORIALIZING CONGRESS TO ENACT LEGISLATION	
ALLOWING CERTAIN NONPHYSICIAN HEALTH CARE	
PROFESSIONALS TO CERTIFY AND AMEND HOME HEALTH PLANS	
OF CARE.	
WHEREAS, Nurse practitioners (NP), clinical nurse specialists	
(CNS), certified nurse midwives (CNM), and physician assistants (PA)	
are playing an increasingly important role in the delivery of our nation's	
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health care, especially in rural and underserved areas in states like	
Colorado; and

3	WHEREAS, In addition, these nonphysician health
4	care professionals are usually readily available to expedite the processing
5	of paperwork, ensuring that home care services begin promptly without
6	interruption and that home care agencies will be reimbursed in a timely
7	manner; and
8	WHEREAS, Colorado law authorizes these nonphysician health
9	care professionals to complete and sign physical exam forms and other
10	types of medical certification documents; and
11	WHEREAS, NPs and PAs can certify Medicare eligibility for
12	skilled nursing facility and hospice services; and
13	WHEREAS, The federal government has also recognized the
14	growing role of PAs and NPs; for example, the federal "Balanced Budget
15	Act of 1997", Pub. L. 105-35, allows Medicare to reimburse PAs and NPs
16	for providing physician services to Medicare patients, including surgery,
17	consultation, and home and institutional visits; and
18	WHEREAS, The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services
19	now allows PAs and NPs to sign certificates of medical necessity, which
20	are required to file a claim for home medical equipment under Medicare,
21	and since 1988, certificates of medical necessity have been authorized to
22	provide maternity-related services to the relatively small population of
23	disabled women of childbearing age who are Medicare-eligible; and
24	WHEREAS, The Institute of Medicine, in its 2010 study, The
25	Future of Nursing: Leading Change, Advancing Health recommended
26	that NPs and CNSs be allowed to certify eligibility for Medicare home
27	health services; and
28	WHEREAS, Despite the expanded role of PAs and NPs in the
29	"Balanced Budget Act of 1997", the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid
30	Services continues to prohibit PAs and NPs and other nonphysician health
31	care professionals from certifying home health services to Medicare
32	beneficiaries because, according to the Centers for Medicare and
33	Medicaid Services, the Medicare statute requires "physician" certification
34	on home health plans of care; and

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WHEREAS, The "Home Health Care Planning Improvement Act" was first introduced in the 110th Congress and would have permitted NPs, CNSs, CNMs, and PAs to certify Medicare home health plans of care; the legislation has been re-introduced in each Congress since then, and in the current 113th Congress, the legislation exists as S.1332/H.R.2504, with the bipartisan cosponsorship of Colorado Representatives Mike Coffman, Cory Gardner, Ed Perlmutter, and Jared Polis; now, therefore,

Be It Resolved by the Senate of the Sixty-ninth General Assembly of the State of Colorado, the House of Representatives concurring herein:

That we, the members of the Colorado General Assembly, call upon the United States Congress to enact the existing bipartisan legislation that would allow nurse practitioners, certified nurse specialists, certified nurse midwives, and physician assistants to certify and make changes to home health plans of care.

Be It Further Resolved, That copies of this Joint Memorial be sent to Colorado's Congressional delegation, Governor John Hickenlooper, the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services, the National Association for Home Care and Hospice, the Home Care Association of Colorado, the Colorado Department of Health Care Policy and Financing, the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment, the Colorado Medical Society, the Colorado Nurses Association, the Colorado Society for Advance Practice Nurses, and the Colorado Academy of Physician Assistants.

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
