Current Appropriations Clause in Bill

The bill includes an appropriation clause that appropriates \$1,695,000 cash funds from the Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities Services Cash Fund to the newly created Cross-System Response for Behavioral Health Crises Pilot Program Fund (Pilot Program Fund) for FY 2015-16. Additionally the appropriation clause provides \$1,695,000 reappropriated funds from the Pilot Program Fund to the Department of Health Care Policy and Financing for FY 2015-16 for the first year operational and capital costs of the pilot program.

Description of Amendments in This Packet

L.001 Bill Sponsor amendment **L.001** (attached) removes the words "at no cost" from the section authorizing the Departments of Human Services and Health Care Policy and Financing to pursue the feasibility of allowing a Community Centered-Board to use a vacant Regional Center group home to align the bill with existing laws prohibiting private agencies use state facilities at no cost.
