AGRICULTURE, LIVESTOCK, & NATURAL RESOURCES

After consideration on the merits, the Committee recommends the following:

6 7 **SB15-014**

be amended as follows, and as so amended, be referred to the Committee on Appropriations with favorable recommendation:

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Amend reengrossed bill, page 7, line 4, after the period add "AN EMPLOYEE, CONTRACTOR, OR OTHER SUPPORT STAFF EMPLOYED BY A LICENSED ENTITY PURSUANT TO ARTICLE 43.3 OR 43.4 OF TITLE 12, C.R.S., 14 OR WORKING IN OR HAVING ACCESS TO A RESTRICTED AREA OF A LICENSED PREMISES PURSUANT TO ARTICLE 43.3 OR 43.4 OF TITLE 12, C.R.S., MAY BE A PRIMARY CAREGIVER.".

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Page 14, after line 10 insert:

"**SECTION 7.** In Colorado Revised Statutes, 6-1-105, add (1) (hhh) as follows:

6-1-105. Deceptive trade practices. (1) A person engages in a deceptive trade practice when, in the course of the person's business, vocation, or occupation, the person:

(hhh) Knowingly represents that Hemp, Hemp oil, or any DERIVATIVE OF A HEMP PLANT CONSTITUTES RETAIL MARIJUANA OR 26 MEDICAL MARIJUANA UNLESS IT FULLY SATISFIES THE DEFINITION OF SUCH PRODUCTS PURSUANT TO SECTION 12-43.4-103 (15), C.R.S., OR SECTION 12-43.3-104 (7), C.R.S.

SECTION 8. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 25-1.5-106, amend 30 (12) (b) (IV) as follows:
