AT A MINIMUM, THE ASSESSMENT CALENDAR MUST SPECIFY THE ESTIMATED HOURS EACH TESTING DAY THAT SPECIFIC CLASSES OR GRADES WILL TAKE EACH ASSESSMENT AND IDENTIFY WHETHER THE ASSESSMENT IS REQUIRED BY FEDERAL LAW OR STATE LAW OR SELECTED BY THE LOCAL EDUCATION PROVIDER.
