This appropriation represents an estimate of the county share of such recoveries and, if the amount of the county share of such recoveries is greater than the amount reflected in this appropriation, the Department is authorized to disburse an amount in excess of this appropriation to reflect the actual county share of such recoveries.

- 26 Department of Human Services, County Administration, County Incentive Payments; Office of Self Sufficiency, Colorado Works Program, County Block Grants; Child Support Enforcement, Child Support Enforcement -- Pursuant to sections 26-13-108 and 26-13-112.5 (2), C.R.S., the Department shall distribute child support incentive payments to counties. Further, all of the State share of recoveries of amounts of support for public assistance recipients, less annual appropriations from this fund source for state child support enforcement operations, be distributed to counties, as described in section 26-13-108, C.R.S. - 29a Department of Human Services, Office of Early Childhood, Division of Community and Family Support, Early Childhood Mental Health Services It is the intent of the General Assembly that this appropriation be used for the purpose of supporting early childhood mental health specialists in each community mental health center.
- 30 Department of Human Services, Office of Self Sufficiency, Colorado Works Program, County Block Grants -- Pursuant to Sections 26-2-714 (7) and 26-2-714 (9), C.R.S., under certain conditions, a county may transfer federal Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) funds within its Colorado Works Program Block Grant to the federal child care development fund or to programs funded by Title XX of the federal Social Security Act. One of the conditions specified is that the amount a county transfers must be specified by the Department of Human Services as being available for transfer within the limitation imposed by federal law. - 32 Department of Human Services, Office of Self Sufficiency, Colorado Works Program, County Block Grants -- It is the intent of the General Assembly that \$2,000,000 of the federal funds appropriation to this line item be allocated to counties for employment-focused programs.
- 33 Department of Human Services, Office of Self Sufficiency, Colorado Works Program, County Block Grants -- The Department may comply with the provisions of Section 26-2-714 (10), C.R.S., by reducing required county Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) maintenance of effort expenditures in the fiscal year after the State is notified that it has met federal work participation rates and qualifies for a percent reduction in the state's maintenance of effort. 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44a DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN SERVICES, ADULT ASSISTANCE PROGRAMS, COMMUNITY SERVICES FOR THE ELDERLY, SENIOR SERVICES DATA EVALUATION -- THIS APPROPRIATION REMAINS AVAILABLE THROUGH JUNE 30, 2017.

SECTION 2. Appropriation to the department of human services for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2015. In Session Laws of Colorado 2015, amend section 5 of chapter 282, (SB 15-012), as follows:

Section 5. Appropriation. (1) For the 2015-16 state fiscal year, \$315,509 is appropriated to the department of human services for use by the office of self sufficiency. This appropriation is from the general fund, and is subject to the "(M)" notation as defined in the general appropriation act for the same fiscal year. To implement this act, the office may use this appropriation as follows:

(a) \$277,522 for changes to the automated child support enforcement system; SYSTEM. OF THESE MONEYS, \$187,933 SHALL BE AVAILABLE TO THE DEPARTMENT UNTIL JUNE 30, 2017; and

(b) \$37,987 for implementation contractor costs.

(2) For the 2015-16 state fiscal year, the general assembly anticipates that the department of human services will receive \$553,386 in federal funds from title IV-D of the social security act for use by the office of self sufficiency. The appropriation in subsection (1) of this section is based on the assumption that the office will receive this amount of federal funds to be used as follows:

(a) \$515,399 for changes to the automated child support enforcement system; SYSTEM. OF THESE MONEYS, \$364,988 SHALL BE AVAILABLE TO THE DEPARTMENT UNTIL JUNE 30, 2017; and

(b) \$37,987 for implementation contractor costs.

**SECTION 3. Safety clause.** The general assembly hereby finds, determines, and declares that this act is necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, and safety.
