A BILL FOR AN ACT

101	CONCERNING INCENTIVES TO BECOME A TEACHER IN A RURAL SCHOOL
102	DISTRICT OF COLORADO, AND, IN CONNECTION THEREWITH,
103	MAKING AN APPROPRIATION.

Bill Summary

The bill creates several methods to address the problem of recruitment and retention of teachers in rural school districts of Colorado (rural districts). This includes:

! Establishing one or more rural education centers housed in institutions of higher education in rural districts;

- ! Providing stipends to offset tuition costs to student teachers who are in approved educator preparation programs and who agree to student teach in a rural district;
- ! Establishing teacher cadet programs in identified rural districts to identify and support high school students interested in pursuing teaching careers in rural districts; and
- ! Providing funds to offset costs for a teacher in a rural district who is pursuing either becoming a national board certified teacher or becoming qualified as a concurrent enrollment teacher in his or her rural district.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Colorado:

9	23-75-105. Teacher cadet program. ON OR BEFORE JULY 1, 2017,
10	THE DEPARTMENT OF HIGHER EDUCATION SHALL ESTABLISH TEACHER
11	$CADETPROGRAMSINIDENTIFIEDRURAL\underline{SCHOOLSAND}SCHOOLDISTRICTS.$
12	Money may be provided to local school <u>districts</u> , <u>charter</u>
13	SCHOOLS, OR THE CHARTER SCHOOL INSTITUTE, ANY OF WHICH MAY
14	CONTRACT WITH A BOARD OF COOPERATIVE SERVICES TO IDENTIFY AND

12	SECTION 2. Appropriation - adjustments to 2016 long bill.
13	(1) To implement this act, appropriations made in the annual general
14	appropriation act for the 2016-17 state fiscal year to the department of
15	education are adjusted as follows:
16	(a) The cash funds appropriation from the state public school fund
17	created in Section 22-54-114 (1), C.R.S., for the state share of districts'
18	total program funding is increased by \$441,095; and
19	(b) The general fund appropriation for the state share of districts'
20	total program funding is decreased by \$441,095.
21	(2) For the 2016-17 state fiscal year, \$441,095 is appropriated to
22	the department of higher education. This appropriation is from the general
23	fund and is based on an assumption that the department will require an
24	additional 0.3 FTE. To implement this act, the department may use this
25	appropriation for rural teacher recruitment, retention, and professional
26	development programs.
27	SECTION 3. Safety clause. The general assembly hereby finds,

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- determines, and declares that this act is necessary for the immediate
- 2 preservation of the public peace, health, and safety.

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
