	A BILL FOR AN ACT
101	CONCERNING A CLARIFICATION OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY'S INTENT
102	TO MAINTAIN THE PUBLIC UTILITIES COMMISSION'S AUTHORITY
103	OVER BASIC EMERGENCY SERVICES WHILE PROHIBITING THE
104	REGULATION OF INTERNET-PROTOCOL-ENABLED SERVICES BY
105	DEFINING THE TERM "BASIC EMERGENCY SERVICE" IN A
106	MANNER THAT IS CONSISTENT WITH SUCH INTENT.

Bill Summary

(Note: This summary applies to this bill as introduced and does not reflect any amendments that may be subsequently adopted. The bill defines "basic emergency service" to mean the

aggregation and transportation of a 911 call by a basic emergency service provider (BESP) to a point of interconnection with a public safety answering point (PSAP), regardless of the technology used by the BESP to provide the service, but does not include:

- ! The portion of a 911 call provided by an originating service provider through use of voice-over-internet-protocol service, internet-protocol-enabled service, or commercial mobile radio service;
- ! The services provided by an intermediary aggregation service provider;
- ! The delivery of a 911 call from the originating service provider or an intermediary aggregation service provider to a point of interconnection with the BESP; or
- ! The delivery of a 911 call from the point of interconnection between the BESP and a PSAP to the PSAP facility that receives and processes the 911 call.

1 Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Colorado:

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- SECTION 1. Legislative declaration. (1) The general assembly hereby finds and declares that:
 - (a) In 2014, the general assembly clearly indicated an intent to prohibit the regulation of voice-over-internet protocol (VoIP) service and internet-protocol-enabled service (IP-enabled service) by the passage of House Bill 14-1329;
 - (b) In addition, the clear legislative intent of House Bill 14-1329 was to maintain, without altering, the authority of the public utilities commission, referred to in this section as the "commission", to regulate basic emergency service, as provided in section 40-15-201 (2), Colorado Revised Statutes, in the same manner as the commission had previously regulated such service, which was the commission's certification and regulation of basic emergency service providers (BESP) and the transfer and delivery of a 911 call from an aggregation point provided by a BESP to a public safety answering point;

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1	(c) House Bill 14-1329, as passed, also clearly reflected the
2	legislative intent to codify the then-existing status quo practice in
3	Colorado of not regulating VoIP and IP-enabled services, to prohibit the
4	regulation of those technologies, and to remove them from the
5	commission's authority. Moreover, nothing in House Bill 14-1329
6	indicated an intent to authorize the commission to regulate any aspect of
7	commercial mobile radio service (CMRS) or CMRS providers. The
8	general assembly has stated, in section 40-1-103 (1) (b), Colorado
9	Revised Statutes, that CMRS providers are not public utilities and has
10	declared CMRS and CMRS providers to be deregulated, in section
11	40-15-401 (1), Colorado Revised Statutes.
12	(d) To further clarify the intent of House Bill 14-1329, this act
13	defines basic emergency service in statute in a manner that clarifies that
14	basic emergency service means the services provided by a BESP,
15	regardless of the technology used by the BESP to provide those services,
16	but does not include the portion of a 911 call transport that could be
17	enabled through the caller's use of VoIP service, IP-enabled service, or
18	other telecommunications services; and
19	(e) Clarification of the definition of basic emergency service is
20	important to make the deregulatory purposes of House Bill 14-1329 and
21	House Bill 14-1331 clear as they pertain to telecommunications service
22	providers.
23	SECTION 2. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 29-11-101, amend
24	(1.2); and add (4.4) and (4.8) as follows:
25	29-11-101. Definitions. As used in this article, unless the context
26	otherwise requires:

(1.2) (a) "Basic emergency service provider" OR "BESP" means

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1	any person authorized CERTIFICATED by the commission to undertake the
2	aggregation and transportation of 911 calls to a PSAP.
3	(b) (I) FOR PURPOSES OF THIS SUBSECTION (1.2), "BASIC
4	EMERGENCY SERVICE" MEANS THE AGGREGATION AND TRANSPORT OF A
5	911 CALL BY A BESP TO A POINT OF INTERCONNECTION WITH A PSAP
6	REGARDLESS OF THE TECHNOLOGY USED BY THE BESP TO PROVIDE THE
7	SERVICE. THE AGGREGATION OF CALLS MEANS THE COLLECTION OF 911
8	CALLS BY A BESP FROM ONE OR MORE LOCAL EXCHANGE PROVIDERS.
9	WIRELESS CARRIERS, VOIP SERVICE PROVIDERS, IP-ENABLED SERVICE
10	PROVIDERS, INTERMEDIARY AGGREGATION SERVICE PROVIDERS, OR OTHER
11	TELECOMMUNICATIONS PROVIDERS, FOR THE PURPOSE OF SELECTING AND
12	TRANSPORTING 911 CALLS TO A POINT OF INTERCONNECTION WITH A
13	PSAP.
14	(II) "BASIC EMERGENCY SERVICE" DOES NOT INCLUDE:
15	(A) THE PORTION OF A 911 CALL PROVIDED BY AN ORIGINATING
16	SERVICE PROVIDER THROUGH THE USE OF VOIP SERVICE, IP-ENABLED
17	SERVICE, OR COMMERCIAL MOBILE RADIO SERVICE, AS THOSE TERMS ARE
18	DEFINED IN SECTION 40-15-102, C.R.S.;
19	(B) THE SERVICES PROVIDED BY AN INTERMEDIARY AGGREGATION
20	SERVICE PROVIDER;
21	$(C) \ \ \text{The delivery of a 911 call from the originating service}$
22	PROVIDER OR AN INTERMEDIARY AGGREGATION SERVICE PROVIDER TO A
23	POINT OF INTERCONNECTION WITH THE BESP; OR
24	(D) THE DELIVERY OF A 911 CALL FROM THE POINT OF
25	INTERCONNECTION BETWEEN THE BESP AND A PSAP TO THE PSAP
26	FACILITY THAT RECEIVES AND PROCESSES THE 911 CALL.
27	(c) FOR PURPOSES OF THIS SUBSECTION (1.2), "911 CALL" MEANS

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1	ANY FORM OF COMMUNICATION, REGARDLESS OF THE TECHNOLOGY USED
2	TO PROVIDE THE CALL AND INCLUDING VOICE, DATA, TEXT, AND VIDEO,
3	THAT USES 911 TO COMMUNICATE OR REPORT AN EMERGENCY OR MATTER
4	OF SAFETY TO A PSAP.
5	(4.4) "INTERMEDIARY AGGREGATION SERVICE PROVIDER" MEANS
6	A PERSON THAT AGGREGATES OR TRANSPORTS 911 CALLS FOR ONE OR
7	MORE ORIGINATING SERVICE PROVIDERS FOR DELIVERY TO A BESP'S
8	911-SELECTIVE ROUTER OR THE FUNCTIONAL EQUIVALENT OF SUCH A
9	ROUTER.
10	(4.8) "Originating service provider" means a person
11	OFFERING OR PROVIDING ANY FORM OF COMMUNICATION SERVICE BY
12	WHICH AN END USER MAY MAKE A 911 CALL.
13	SECTION 3. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 40-15-102, add (2.5),
14	(2.7), (14.3), (20.8), and (23.5) as follows:
15	40-15-102. Definitions. As used in this article, unless the context
16	otherwise requires:
17	(2.5)(a) "BASIC EMERGENCY SERVICE" MEANS THE AGGREGATION
18	AND TRANSPORT OF A 911 CALL BY A BESP TO A POINT OF
19	INTERCONNECTION WITH A PSAP, REGARDLESS OF THE TECHNOLOGY USED
20	BY THE BESP TO PROVIDE THE SERVICE. THE AGGREGATION OF CALLS
21	MEANS THE COLLECTION OF 911 CALLS BY A BESP FROM ONE OR MORE
22	LOCAL EXCHANGE PROVIDERS, WIRELESS CARRIERS, VOIP SERVICE
23	PROVIDERS, IP-ENABLED SERVICE PROVIDERS, INTERMEDIARY
24	AGGREGATION SERVICE PROVIDERS, OR OTHER TELECOMMUNICATIONS
25	PROVIDERS, FOR THE PURPOSE OF SELECTING AND TRANSPORTING 911
26	CALLS TO A POINT OF INTERCONNECTION WITH A PSAP.
27	(b) "Basic emergency service" does not include:

12	(c) For purposes of this subsection (2.5), and subsections
13	(2.7) AND (14.3) OF THIS SECTION, "911 CALL" MEANS ANY FORM OF
14	COMMUNICATION, REGARDLESS OF THE TECHNOLOGY USED TO PROVIDE
15	THE CALL AND INCLUDING VOICE, DATA, TEXT, AND VIDEO, THAT USES 911
16	TO COMMUNICATE OR REPORT AN EMERGENCY OR MATTER OF SAFETY TO
17	A PSAP.
18	(2.7) "BASIC EMERGENCY SERVICE PROVIDER" OR "BESP" MEANS
19	ANY PERSON CERTIFICATED BY THE COMMISSION TO UNDERTAKE THE
20	AGGREGATION AND TRANSPORTATION OF 911 CALLS TO A PSAP.
21	(14.3) "Intermediary aggregation service provider" means
22	A PERSON THAT AGGREGATES OR TRANSPORTS 911 CALLS FOR ONE OR
23	MORE ORIGINATING SERVICE PROVIDERS FOR DELIVERY TO A BESP'S
24	911-SELECTIVE ROUTER OR THE FUNCTIONAL EQUIVALENT OF SUCH A
25	ROUTER.
26	(20.8) "Originating service provider" means a person

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1	WHICH AN END USER MAY MAKE A 911 CALL.
2	(23.5) "PUBLIC SAFETY ANSWERING POINT" OR "PSAP" MEANS A
3	FACILITY EQUIPPED AND STAFFED TO RECEIVE AND PROCESS 911 CALLS ON
4	A 24-HOUR BASIS IN A CHOSEN FORMAT.
5	SECTION 4. Safety clause. The general assembly hereby finds,
5	determines, and declares that this act is necessary for the immediate
7	preservation of the public peace, health, and safety.

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
