TITLE: CONCERNING THE ELIMINATION OF OBSOLETE STATUTORY LANGUAGE.

Summary of Assessment

The bill repeals or amends several outdated provisions in the Colorado Revised Statutes. As such, it will not affect state or local government revenues or expenditures and is assessed as having no fiscal impact. Unless a referendum petition is filed, the bill will take effect August 9, 2006, assuming the General Assembly adjourns on May 10, 2006, as scheduled.

Among other things, the bill repeals or amends outdated statutory provisions regarding:

- the Subsequent Injury Fund, the Disaster Emergency Fund, the Colorado State Veterans Trust Fund, and the Law Enforcement Assistance Fund for the Prevention of Drunken Driving;
- property transfers among various departments of state government;
- benefits paid under the "Colorado Employment Security Act";
- state funding of courts, the maintenance of court facilities, and the number of judges on the Court of Appeals;
- the State Solicitor and the Division of the State Solicitor General;
- the statewide program for identifying matters of state interest as part of local land use planning, and contracts implicated in transferring the State Planning Office to the Division of Planning;
- short term loans under the Home Investment Trust Fund;
- the Merit System established by the State Personnel Board;
- reporting requirements under the Community-based Access Grant Program;
- reporting requirements of the Division of Criminal Justice related to the use of no-knock search warrants;
- the timing of rule promulgation regarding the Victims Assistance and Law Enforcement Fund;
- the timing of rule promulgation regarding safety and security to protect state personnel and property owned or leased by the state, and the continuity of state government operations;
- registration requirements for fire suppression contractors;
- farmers' chemist for sugar factories; and
- predatory animals.
