On motion of Senator Gordon, and with the unanimous consent of those elected to the Senate, the Senate stood in recess to hear the opening day remarks of Senate President Joan Fitz-Gerald and Minority Leader Andy McElhany. The text of their remarks follows.

Senate in recess.

## **President Fitz-Gerald's remarks:**

Good morning and welcome honored guests, family, friends and my fellow Senators. I am

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pleased to welcome you to the opening 2nd session of the 65th Colorado General Assembly.

Let us pause to remember our soldiers, past and present, who have served their nation honorably. We appreciate their service and sacrifice.

Last weekend, three soldiers, Captain Michael Martinez, Major Douglas Labouff, and 1st Lt. Joseph D. deMoors, from the Third Armored Calvary Regiment at Fort Carson were killed while serving in Iraq. They paid the ultimate price – and this morning our thoughts and prayers are with their families.

I ask for a moment of silence.

We are here today because there is much work ahead of us.

We must begin repairing the foundation of our state.

And so this morning let me talk about where we have been; where we are now and where we should be going.

I borrow from Charles Dickens in a "Tale of Two Cities" when I describe 2005 as – "It was the best of times, and it was the worst of times.

Last year, our state's government stood at the brink of a financial crisis:

Colorado had lost 150,000 jobs,

Our state faced millions of dollars in additional budget cuts to programs that affected families across the state,

Thousands of low income men and women lost their Medicaid benefits,

And from Ft. Collins to Durango, college students faced double digit tuition increases at the same time that our schools were forced to cut back on classes and professors.

Across the state, many of us heard from people from all walks of life, young workers, retirees, middle class parents, and the elderly. Many of them with the same fears – telling us they stay awake at night, worrying that they're just one paycheck away from financial

That was the worst of times.

We looked around and said, "Colorado can do better."

So we laid out a vision - to help find a paycheck for every family, a schoolbook for every child and, a doctor for every patient.

Because, in spite of our differences – there are things we can all agree on. From the Western Slope to the Eastern plains - families need access to affordable health care, quality schools for their children, and a growing economy that helps them provide for a brighter future.

And so we began the journey toward better days, a journey toward a better Colorado.

Working together, this Legislative body strengthened the enforcement of securities law to protect our pensions and savings. We helped provide more energy assistance for lowincome households. And, we developed an appeals process for patients who were denied coverage by their insurers.

And, most importantly, we held ourselves fiscally accountable. We made deep and painful 60 cuts to our state budget. Long hours were spent finding solutions that didn't drastically compromise the welfare of Coloradans, but enabled the state to function. This disciplined process allowed us to tread water until a more permanent solution could be found.

That is where we were.

Today we are in a different place.

With the passage of Referendum C, Colorado voters affirmed our legislative priorities, and 69 gave us a mandate to continue work on strengthening our schools, to continue to find ways for Coloradans to have quality health care, to continue our financial support of our institutions of higher education, and to make sure that we have safe roads taking us where

we need to go.

Referendum C gives us the opportunity to look ahead; the luxury of making plans that will enable us to secure our future.

We have taken the first step.

So let me talk about the most important issues for this legislative session: A Colorado full of opportunity, security and accountability.

With these priorities in place, we will go to work:

**Healthcare** - We will work to lower the cost of healthcare. This means lowering the cost of prescription drugs and increasing access to health clinics in our rural and urban communities. We will also challenge ourselves to guarantee that over the next five years every child in Colorado will have access to basic healthcare. No parent should have to decide between what's best for their child's health and it's affordability. Our children deserve a healthy start in life.

**Education** - Every child - no matter where they live, no matter who their parents are, no matter what their economic status - every child deserves a chance at school readiness. The history of a child should not be written before the age of six.

One day, we will all look back on this General Assembly. So let us remember we are in competition with the whole world and let us academically prepare our children better than any other place in any other country at any other time.

**Higher Education** - Our colleges and universities should be a beacon attracting brilliant scholars that craft life-changing improvements in all of our lives through research and innovation.

President John F. Kennedy once said, "Our progress as a nation can be no swifter than our progress in education."

This means going beyond just restoring cuts made in previous years. Investing in colleges and universities is just good business sense. Higher paying jobs demand higher learning.

**Immigration** – Let's talk for a moment about illegal immigration.

Let's face facts. Our borders are not secure. There is no one simple answer to this problem - and it is a problem.

We must continue working to protect the jobs and wages of Coloradans. This must be done, however, with respect for human dignity and without violating or diminishing civil rights.

But we cannot do it alone. Today, I challenge the federal government to enforce our nation's immigration laws, to examine our nation's needs for workers, to enforce wage and hour laws, to prevent exploitation of any human being and to protect our standard of living.

Let's get away from the rhetoric and find solutions by working together with respect and civility. We need to work with our neighboring states and our federal government to create legislation that is realistic, enforceable and responsible.

Finally, a word about accountability: In changing over from old, cumbersome computer systems, the State of Colorado has again and again failed to manage contracts responsibly. To that end I am appointing a Select Committee on Government Accountability.

The failures of these contracts and the procedures that got us there must be examined and corrected.

Colorado's taxpayers deserve answers.

As we move forward in 2006, let us make progress on the issues that affect all Coloradans.

This session we will revisit good ideas that were put on the back burner. We will continue to pass legislation that is meaningful and good for Colorado.

Some ideas are worth fighting for.

We are guided by the vision of what President Clinton called "a government for tomorrow

- not our yesterdays."

The Colorado our children will inherit will depend upon what we do today. Can we look to the future and have the determination to do what is right and not what is "right now"? Or will we stop at today and think only of our limited time in this body?

Let us continue down this path we have started - focusing on progress.

My fellow Senators, as elected representatives, we must believe in our mission to serve our neighbor. It means being accountable for the work we do here and the policies we enact.

Join me in a commitment to a responsible and responsive government that protects the well being and safety of our communities and promotes economic vitality for all our citizens.

We would do well to heed the lessons from Hurricane Katrina. Government has a function and a role to play. When we are not prepared - not just for natural disasters -but to deliver services - that is a failure.

It is a new day in Colorado. Last year, we were a sleeping giant full of potential. This year we are waking to find a better Colorado. We stand on the cusp of a new day and a new era, but make no mistake about it the passage of Referendum C was only the first step of many.

As we consider our limited time in this body, I want to digress and acknowledge that at the end of this session several senators will be taking their leave because of term limits. Senators Evans, Lamborn, Owen and Teck will be taking with them the invaluable experience and wisdom that comes from serving in this body.

While we understand that term limits fulfill the legacy of citizen legislators, they also impact the institutional memory and leadership of this body. Each of these senators has served this state with loyalty and dedication.

No one embodied that quite like Senator Norma Anderson. Today would have marked the beginning of her 20th and final session. Senator Anderson was either a loyal ally or a tough adversary depending on where you stood. Though we were adversaries at times, at the end of the day we put aside our differences and traveled across the state in support of Referendum C. She will be missed.

Senator Kathleen Traylor has been selected to replace Senator Anderson. Senator, your predecessor set the bar very high and we look forward to seeing you thrive and grow as a legislator.

Today, right now, this body must grow and thrive as well. The residents of this great state deserve policies that are relevant to their daily lives. We must work on issues that affect all of us - for there are things we can all agree on.

As we embark on a new Legislative session, citizens will be watching us closely - making sure we are faithful to their vision.

My fellow Senators, as elected representatives -it is our chance to make 2006 the best of times.

I look forward to each of us using our individual talents to lay the foundation for what kind of state we want Colorado to be.

President Fitz-Gerald recognized Minority Leader, Senator Andy McElhany to address the Senate.

## **Senator McElhany's remarks:**

Our caucus wants to make sure that the revenue raised by Referendum C, enacted by the voters state-wide in November is used to bridge the basic budgetary gaps as the public was promised. K-12 education as well as our state's institutions of higher learning will get some budgetary breathing room as well our state's overburdened medicaid budget.

However, we must not use Referendum C's money to create new programs with new entitlements that establish boundless expectations of adding more and more beneficiaries

each year. We will keep a watchful eye on any attempts to expand government instead of doing what the voters charged us with doing. That means plugging the holes in existing government services. We'll be especially wary of any attempts to create new spending programs in the guise of improving existing ones.

There are, of course, legal limits, topping off the state's operating budget with new funding. Those limits will require a lot of "C"'s new money, at first to be spent on backlogged capital needs. That's long overdue, especially when it comes to Colorado's underfunded transportation infrastructure.

While the legislative leadership in the majority party generally has acknowledged this reality, at least some folks across the aisle have been wavering on this point. Our highways need money now. Voter approval of Referendum C explicitly authorized transportation funding. And especially in this 1st year after "C"'s passage, we must do all we can to begin restoring our state's sagging transportation infrastructure.

Our role as a watchdog also means that we stand ready to head off attempts by some lawmakers to increase burdens on Colorado's investors, entrepreneurs, and other business owners. That includes "Mom & Pop" businesses which are the backbone of the economy in so many communities across Colorado.

Our party long has recognized that our jobs and prosperity overall depend on the people who risk their own capital to provide all of us goods and services. They are the ones who truly drive economic development.

That's why we must insure that they are not hounded by frivolous personal injury lawsuits or unwarranted irresponsible workers compensation costs. Working closely with our Governor, we, Republicans, helped turn back a raft of bills during the 2005 Session that could have sent workers compensation insurance costs through the roof for employers. Those employers are the job creators in Colorado, and we do not want to penalize job creators.

In general, we want to look out for the interest of the individual against the fiscal follies, micro- meddling, and social engineering of big government. We can be counted on to stand up for private property rights against the abuse of the government's power of imminent domain, and you can expect legislation along those lines this session.

You also can look to us to try to ease the burden that illegal immigration places on taxpayers in drawing down public services. In other words, we're here to make sure that state government takes care of business basics like roads and education while staying on a strict budgetary diet. We want the state to attend to its business without telling our citizens how to run theirs.

As we go into the next 120 days there will be a challenge. We face a skeptical public. During the end of the last session, I was out at Health Sciences having a small skin cancer removed from my lower leg. I made the mistake of thinking that during the middle of the procedure that I would look and see how it was coming. I took one look and laid back down and said "I can't look at that." The doctor, with missing a beat, said, "That's alright, Senator, we can't bear to watch while you work either."

If the public is skeptical, it tends to be even schizophrenic at times. We've got the same people complaining that oil prices are too high and that Wal-Mart sells things too cheaply.

Several weeks ago, Senator Gordon and I met to talk about some of the rules and procedures of the upcoming session. Senator Gordon mentioned to me that we spend a lot of time each session with one party trying to embarrass the other, and one party trying to put the other on record on various votes, and wondering if we couldn't stay away from those things this session.

I said, "Senator Gordon, we're in the minority and we have little else to do."

Senator Gordon said, "I will try to find some more constructive channels for your energies." or something to that regard. Well, as you know, where there's a need, nature provides a solution.

Some of us were very fortunate recently to hear an address by former Israeli Prime Minister, Shimon Peres, when he was talking about the majority setting policy and doing things like that. He said, "When you are in the minority you can write poetry and compose music. So Senator Gordon, I will instruct my caucus, that when we offer amendments to put you on record that we will do it in either iambic pentameter or set to music. That will solve both of our issues.

As many of us attend legislative conferences, we hear stories that a good many of the Tennessee legislature was recently led away in a sting operation for taking bribes. We don't have that sort of thing in Colorado.

When we were in the House of Representatives, I think now the rule has been changed, it was the Speaker's prerogative to appoint all members of the committees of reference, even the minority members. But as a courtesy, the Speaker let the Minority Leader make those appointments to the committees of reference. There are many other states where that same power exists, but either the President or the Speaker makes all the appointments. And they do it in a way to cripple the minority party. So that, for example, there is somebody who has expertise in education the Speaker would stick that person on the ag. committee. Yes, it cripples the minority party, but it also cripples the process. I'm delighted to say that we do not have that sort of thing going on in Colorado.

It is a time to look forward with optimism and anticipation for what is coming. For me, it's also a time to remember some of the memories and instructions that we've had in the past.

I think in closing, I would talk a little bit about coming in as a freshman in the House of Representatives. Tim Foster was the Majority Leader and Carl Hillard was a 30 year+reporter for the Associated Press. He came into the freshmen caucus to give us a little advice. I remember Rep. Foster saying that this a very formal place. It is intentionally a very formal place. It needs to be that way to preserve the decorum and the process.

As we go forward there will be spirited debate in this "well". There will be emotional debate. But we continue to address each other as "Senator" and respect the constituents that each of us represents.

And finally, Carl Hillard's parting advice, when he retired was, "Respect this institution, take it seriously, take what you do seriously, take your job seriously, but for heaven's sake, don't take yourself seriously."

Congratulations to all of you, and I look forward to the work of the next 120 days.

The President appointed Senators Groff and Johnson to serve on the committee to escort the Governor to the joint session.
