

Amendment__ Late Abortions

Amendment is a proposed amendment to the Colorado statutes that:

2 3	 makes it a crime to perform a late abortion except in the case of a medical emergency; 	
4 5	 defines a late abortion as an abortion of a fetus that is able to live outside of the womb with or without life support; 	
6 7 8	 requires that a second doctor be present to attend to the fetus when a pregnancy is terminated after the point in time that a fetus is able to live outside the womb; and 	
9 10	 requires doctors and facilities to report certain information on late abortions to the state. 	
11	Summary and Analysis	
12 13 14 15 16 17	U.S. Supreme Court decisions on abortion allow states to impose restrictions or late abortions so long as these restrictions do not endanger the life or health of the woman Current state law does not limit when an abortion can be performed. Amendment makes it a crime for a doctor to perform an abortion if the fetus is able to live outside the womb with or without life support. If a pregnant woman's medical condition would likely result in her death or permanent injury, a late abortion is permitted.	
18 19 20 21 22 23 24	When can an abortion be performed under Amendment? Doctors may continue to perform abortions up to the point when the fetus can live outside the womb with or without life support. Amendment does not provide a specific gestational age for when a fetus can live outside the womb. The point at which a fetus meets this standard varies among pregnancies and must be determined by a doctor, but most often occurs sometime between the 20th and 27th week of pregnancy. Childbirth generally occurs at 40 weeks gestation.	
25 26 27 28	Once a fetus can live outside the womb, the doctor must try to protect the life of the fetus when terminating a pregnancy by choosing the medical procedure that provides the best opportunity for fetal survival, unless it significantly increases the risk of harm to the woman. In addition, a second doctor must be present to attend to the fetus.	

What are the penalties for performing a late abortion? Amendment __ specifies that performing a late abortion is a class four felony with a penalty of two to six years imprisonment, or a fine of up to \$500,000, or both. The woman is not penalized for having a late abortion.

Reporting requirements. Current law requires that every abortion performed in the state, regardless of gestation, be reported to the state within 5 days of the abortion. Amendment _____ requires a doctor who performs a late abortion to file a report with the state within 30 days. The report must include specified information about the doctor, the patient, the fetus, and the basis for the decision to perform a late abortion. For example, the report must include the patient's age, the number of prior pregnancies and prior abortions of the patient, the type of procedure used, and the basis for determining the gestational age of the fetus. The report cannot identify the patient's name. Facilities are also required to report the number of late abortions performed quarterly.

How many abortions are performed in Colorado? Table 1 identifies the number of abortions performed in the state during 2005 according to estimated gestational week.

Table 1. Abortions Performed in Colorado in 2005

Arguments For

- 26 1) Aborting a fetus that is sufficiently developed to live outside of the womb is unethical.
- 27 The only event separating a viable fetus from being considered a person is delivery. In
- 28 instances when a fetus is capable of living outside of the womb, the fetus should be
- 29 protected, delivered and allowed to live.
- 30 2) The proposal does not create an undue burden on a woman's right to choose to have an
- 31 abortion. A woman may still choose to have an abortion in the earlier weeks of pregnancy
- 32 prior to viability of the fetus. Most Colorado women who choose to have an abortion do
- so in the first 20 weeks of pregnancy. Late abortions will still be permitted in cases where
- 34 the mother's life or health is endangered.

Arguments Against

1) The proposal interferes in personal, private medical decisions and in the doctor/patient relationship. A woman may seek a late abortion because she or the fetus she is carrying has developed a severe medical problem that was not diagnosed earlier in the pregnancy. In such situations, a doctor, in consultation with the woman, should determine the best course of action. Under the proposal, the state, not the woman and her doctor, decides

- 2) The proposal subjects doctors to criminal prosecution for performing abortions based upon the viability of the fetus, a constantly changing and undefinable standard. The point at which a fetus is able to live outside of the womb with or without life support is subject to medical interpretation, yet under the proposal, a doctor could go to jail if others disagree with his or her medical judgment. Because of the potential for criminal prosecution,
- doctors may be unwilling to perform any abortions.

Estimate of Fiscal Impact

Amendment ____ will not significantly affect state and local revenue or spending.

It is assumed that medical professions will comply with the new law. No new fine revenue or incarceration costs are anticipated. Minor costs to comply with the amendment's reporting requirements can be absorbed within current state funding. Costs that may result from potential legal challenges to the amendment are not estimated.
