WHEREAS, The narrow gauge lines of the Denver
& Rio Grande Western Railroad Company serve ap-
proximately 85,000 inhabitants of Southwestern Colo-
rado as their only railroad outlet from such district;

WHEREAS, Said narrow gauge lines of railroad are
vitally necessary for the transportation of agricultural
crops and livestock, and strategic war metals, such
as zinc, lead, copper, and vanadium;

WHEREAS, Other forms of transportation are in-
adequate to supplant said narrow gauge lines;

WHEREAS, The United States Government has
heretofore requisitioned and taken seven of the largest
and newest types of narrow gauge locomotives from
said railroad lines, which then left only forty-one
narrow gauge engines in the possession of said The
Denver & Rio Grande Western Railroad Company;

WHEREAS, The United States Government through
its Army is now endeavoring to requisition three more
