WE HAVE SHARED THE GOOD FORTUNE OF A STRONG 20 ECONOMY AND BUDGET SURPLUSES. DUE TO AMENDMENT 23, WE FACE A TIGHTER BUDGET THAN ANY I HAVE SEEN IN MY PREVIOUS SIX YEARS IN THIS CHAMBER.
