Strike the Civil Justice & Judiciary Committee Report, dated February 6, 24 2001 (printed in House Journal, February 8, pages 330-332). 25 26 Amend printed bill, strike everything below the enacting clause and 27 substitute the following: 28 29 "SECTION 1. Part 1 of article 4 of title 42, Colorado Revised Statutes, is amended BY THE ADDITION OF A NEW SECTION to 31 read: 32 33 42-4-115. Information on traffic law enforcement - collection - profiling - annual report - repeal. (1) THE COLORADO STATE PATROL 35 AND ANY LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCY PERFORMING TRAFFIC STOPS THAT SERVES THE CITY AND COUNTY OF DENVER SHALL COLLECT AND MAINTAIN 37 THE FOLLOWING INFORMATION REGARDING EACH TRAFFIC STOP: 38 39 (a) THE NUMBER OF PERSONS DETAINED FOR ROUTINE TRAFFIC 40 INFRACTIONS AND WHETHER A CITATION OR WARNING WAS ISSUED AS A RESULT OF THE TRAFFIC STOP: 42 43 (b) IDENTIFYING CHARACTERISTICS OF THE PERSONS DETAINED DURING THE TRAFFIC STOP, INCLUDING RACE OR ETHNICITY, AGE, AND 45 GENDER; 46 47 (c) THE APPROXIMATE DATE, TIME, AND LOCATION OF THE TRAFFIC 48 STOP: 49 50 (d) THE ALLEGED VIOLATION LEADING TO THE TRAFFIC STOP; 51 52 (e) WHETHER A SEARCH OF THE PERSON OCCURRED AS A RESULT 53 OF THE TRAFFIC STOP;

(f) WHETHER, AS A RESULT OF THE TRAFFIC STOP, THE PERSON'S VEHICLE OR PERSONAL EFFECTS OR THE VEHICLE'S DRIVER OR PASSENGERS

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52 53 WERE SEARCHED AND THE RACE OR ETHNICITY, AGE, AND GENDER OF ANY PERSON SEARCHED;

- 4 (g) Whether the Search was conducted pursuant to 5 consent, probable cause, or reasonable suspicion to suspect a 6 crime, including the basis for the request for consent or the 7 circumstances establishing probable cause or reasonable 8 suspicion;
 - (h) WHETHER ANY CONTRABAND WAS FOUND AS A RESULT OF THE TRAFFIC STOP;
 - (i) WHETHER AN ARREST WAS MADE AS A RESULT OF THE TRAFFIC STOP;
 - (j) WHETHER ANY PROPERTY WAS SEIZED AS A RESULT OF THE TRAFFIC STOP;
- 19 (k) Whether the officers detaining the driver or any 20 passengers during the traffic stop engaged in the use of force 21 against the driver or any passengers.
- 23 (2) NOTHING IN THIS SECTION SHALL BE CONSTRUED TO REQUIRE
 24 THE COLLECTION AND MAINTENANCE OF INFORMATION IN CONNECTION
 25 WITH ROADBLOCKS, VEHICLE CHECKS, OR CHECKPOINTS, EXCEPT WHEN
 26 SUCHTRAFFIC STOPS RESULT IN A WARNING, SEARCH, SEIZURE, OR ARREST.
- (3) Beginning January 1, 2002, and continuing through January 1, 2004, the Colorado state patrol and any law enforcement agency performing traffic stops that serves the city and county of Denver shall annually compile the information gathered pursuant to subsection (1) of this section and shall make such information available to the public.
 - (4) This section is repealed, effective January 1, 2004.
- SECTION 2. Part 3 of article 31 of title 24, Colorado Revised Statutes, is amended BY THE ADDITION OF A NEW SECTION to read:
- 41 **24-31-309. Profiling officer identification training.**42 (1) (a) The General assembly finds, determines, and declares
 43 That profiling is a practice that presents a great danger to the
 44 Fundamental principles of our constitutional republic and is
 45 ABHORRENT AND CANNOT BE TOLERATED.
- (b) The general assembly further finds and declares that Motorists who have been stopped by the police for no reason other than the color of their skin or their apparent race, ethnicity, age, or gender are the victims of discriminatory practices.
- 53 (c) The General assembly further finds and declares that
 54 the working men and women in Colorado law enforcement risk
 55 their lives every day. The people of Colorado greatly
 56 appreciate the hard work and dedication of law enforcement

OFFICERS IN PROTECTING PUBLIC SAFETY. THE GOOD NAME OF THESE OFFICERS SHOULD NOT BE TARNISHED BY THE ACTIONS OF THOSE FEW WHO COMMIT DISCRIMINATORY PRACTICES.

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(d) It is therefore the intent of the general assembly in 6 ADOPTING THIS SECTION TO PROVIDE A MEANS OF IDENTIFICATION OF LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS WHO ARE ENGAGING IN PROFILING, TO 8 UNDERSCORE THE ACCOUNTABILITY OF THOSE OFFICERS FOR THEIR ACTIONS, AND TO PROVIDE TRAINING TO THOSE OFFICERS ON HOW TO 10 AVOID PROFILING.

(2) FOR PURPOSES OF THIS SECTION, "PROFILING" MEANS THE 13 PRACTICE OF DETAINING A SUSPECT BASED ON RACE, ETHNICITY, AGE, OR 14 GENDER WITHOUT THE EXISTENCE OF ANY INDIVIDUALIZED SUSPICION OF 15 THE PARTICULAR PERSON BEING STOPPED.

(3) Any peace officer certified pursuant to this part 3 18 SHALL NOT ENGAGE IN PROFILING.

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(4) (a) A PEACE OFFICER CERTIFIED PURSUANT TO THIS PART 3 SHALL PROVIDE, WITHOUT BEING ASKED, HIS OR HER BUSINESS CARD TO ANY PERSON WHOM THE OFFICER HAS DETAINED IN A TRAFFIC STOP, BUT 23 HAS NOT CITED OR ARRESTED. THE BUSINESS CARD SHALL INCLUDE 24 IDENTIFYING INFORMATION ABOUT THE PEACE OFFICER INCLUDING, BUT NOT LIMITED TO, THE PEACE OFFICER'S NAME, DIVISION, PRECINCT, AND 26 BADGE OR OTHER IDENTIFICATION NUMBER AND A TELEPHONE NUMBER THAT MAY BE USED, IF NECESSARY, TO REPORT ANY COMMENTS, POSITIVE OR NEGATIVE, REGARDING THE TRAFFIC STOP.

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(b) THE PROVISIONS OF PARAGRAPH (a) OF THIS SUBSECTION (4) SHALL NOT APPLY TO AUTHORIZED UNDERCOVER OPERATIONS CONDUCTED BY ANY LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCY.

(c) EACH LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCY IN THE STATE SHALL 35 COMPILE ON AT LEAST AN ANNUAL BASIS ANY INFORMATION DERIVED 36 FROM TELEPHONE CALLS RECEIVED DUE TO THE DISTRIBUTION OF BUSINESS CARDS AS DESCRIBED IN PARAGRAPH (a) OF THIS SUBSECTION (4) AND THAT 38 ALLEGE PROFILING. THE AGENCY SHALL MAKE SUCH INFORMATION 39 AVAILABLE TO THE PUBLIC BUT SHALL NOT INCLUDE THE NAMES OF PEACE 40 OFFICERS IN SUCH INFORMATION. THE AGENCY MAY ALSO INCLUDE IN SUCH INFORMATION THE COSTS TO THE AGENCY OF COMPLYING WITH THE 42 PROVISIONS OF THIS SUBSECTION (4).

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(5) THE TRAINING PROVIDED BY THE P.O.S.T. BOARD FOR PEACE 45 OFFICERS SHALL INCLUDE AN EXAMINATION OF THE PATTERNS, PRACTICES, AND PROTOCOLS THAT RESULT IN PROFILING AND PRESCRIBE PATTERNS. PRACTICES, AND PROTOCOLS THAT PREVENT PROFILING. ON OR BEFORE AUGUST 1, 2001, THE P.O.S.T. BOARD SHALL CREATE THE CURRICULUM 49 FOR SUCH TRAINING.

(6) NO LATER THAN SIX MONTHS AFTER THE EFFECTIVE DATE OF 52 THIS SECTION, EACH LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCY IN THE STATE SHALL 53 HAVE WRITTEN POLICIES, PROCEDURES, AND TRAINING IN PLACE THAT ARE SPECIFICALLY DESIGNED TO ADDRESS PROFILING. THE WRITTEN POLICIES AND PROCEDURES SHALL BE MADE AVAILABLE TO THE PUBLIC FOR 56 INSPECTION DURING REGULAR BUSINESS HOURS.

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SECTION 3. Safety clause. The general assembly hereby finds, determines, and declares that this act is necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, and safety.".
