- (1) THE CHIEF OF THE FIRE DEPARTMENT IN EACH FIRE PROTECTION

(3) (a) The chief of the fire department in each fire protection 28 29 district in the state of Colorado, by virtue of such office so held by him, 30 shall have authority over the supervision of all fires within the district; 31 except as otherwise provided by law EXCEPT THAT RESPONSIBILITY FOR 32 COORDINATING FIRE SUPPRESSION EFFORTS IN CASE OF ANY PRAIRIE. 33 FOREST, OR WILD LAND FIRE THAT EXCEEDS THE CAPABILITIES OF THE 34 DISTRICT TO CONTROL OR EXTINGUISH SHALL BE TRANSFERRED TO THE 35 COUNTY SHERIFF IN ACCORDANCE WITH SECTION 30-10-513, C.R.S., 36 subject to the duties and obligations imposed by this subsection (3). and 37 THE CHIEF shall be vested with such other express authority as is

- 1 contained in this subsection (3), including commanding the fire 2 department of such district.
- SECTION 7. Effective date. This act shall take effect upon passage; except that portion of section 1 of this act containing new subsection 29-22.5-104 (6), Colorado Revised Statutes, shall only take effect if Senate Bill 09-001 is enacted at the First Regular Session of the Sixty-seventh General Assembly and becomes law.
- 8 SECTION 8. Safety clause. The general assembly hereby finds, 9 determines, and declares that this act is necessary for the immediate 10 preservation of the public peace, health, and safety.".
