23

24 This bill, and the accompanying legislative items that comprise the FY 2016-17
25 budget, reflect the commitment and collaboration of many participants over the
26 last year. The Colorado General Assembly has a long history of setting aside
27 disagreements that in other states would lead to acrimonious gridlock. In
28 keeping with that tradition, the budget agreement reflects the best spirit of
29 bipartisanship in the United States and it will effectively serve the entire state
30 Colorado.

31

32 Notable highlights include:

33

34 · *K-12 Education* – With the expected passage of the annual School
35 Finance Act, funding for primary and secondary education will
36 increase with inflation and enrollment over the prior year. In
37 addition, the negative factor is reduced to \$830.7 million for FY
38 2016-17, \$24.5 million below the \$855.2 million contained in the
39 initial FY 2015-16 appropriation.

40

41 · *Child Welfare* – In the second phase of a continuing effort to boost
42 funding for child welfare at the county level, this budget sets aside
43 \$6.1 million General Fund for an additional 100 caseworkers in
44 counties throughout Colorado.

45

46 · *Youth Corrections* – With an increase of \$2.2 million General Fund,
47 this budget adds 36.3 FTE to address safety concerns in Colorado's
48 State-owned and State-operated youth corrections facilities.

49

50 · *Transportation* – The budget plan allocates \$150 million from the
51 General Fund to the Highway Users Tax Fund to support
52 transportation infrastructure.

53

54 As we look into future fiscal years, State Constitutional limits on revenue and
55 requirements to increase expenditures will create challenging budget situations
56 even if Colorado continues to experience positive economic conditions.

1 Meanwhile, though the current economic expansion continues, we continue to
2 monitor the impact of the decline of the oil and gas sector and its impact on the
3 overall economy and local communities.

4

5 **Concerns with H.B. 16-1405 Footnotes**

6 It is the Governor's constitutional obligation to review the general
7 appropriations bill and exercise the line item veto when necessary. We
8 recognize and appreciate the legitimate and reasonable expression by the
9 General Assembly of the intent associated with certain appropriations contained
10 in the FY 2016-17 Long Bill. In fact, many of these expressions of intent are
11 based on information contained within the Executive Branch budget requests.

12 In general, we interpret most of these expressions of intent as different from
13 attempts to administer appropriations or to pursue substantive law via the
14 general appropriations bill. Thus, we have not vetoed any of the footnotes in
15 H.B. 16-1405.

16

17 While the Legislature has the prerogative to express its intent, the Executive
18 Branch maintains the clear and inherent responsibility to administer
19 appropriations (see *Colorado General Assembly v. Owens*, 136 P.3d 262 (Colo.
20 2006); *Colorado General Assembly v. Lamm*, 704 P.2d 1371 (Colo. 1985); and
21 *Anderson v. Lamm*, 195 Colo. 437, 579 P.2d 620 (1978)). For this reason, we
22 have directed Executive Branch agencies to comply with the intent of the
23 footnotes contained in H.B. 16-1405 only to the extent practicable and
24 appropriate.

25

26 Moreover, if operational needs dictate otherwise, the Executive Branch will not
27 be constrained by any limitations implied within any of the Long Bill footnotes.
28 In particular, footnotes that indicate dollar amounts for expenditure in specific
29 programs or for specific purposes may comprise attempts by the General
30 Assembly to administer the appropriation, and State departments may deviate
31 from the intent expressed as necessary.

32

33 Five footnotes included in H.B. 16-1405 are of particular concern to us:

34

- 35 • **Footnote 1, page 13:** Department of Agriculture, Agriculture Services,
36 Plant Industry Division – It is the intent of the General Assembly that the
37 portion of this appropriation used by the Division to support the 13.3 FTE
38 for the inspection and enforcement of pesticide use on marijuana and
39 industrial hemp crops not be continued for any fiscal year after FY 2017-18,
40 unless justification for the continued need is provided by the Department
41 through a formal request.

42

43 Our administration believes that the safe use of pesticides on marijuana
44 and industrial hemp crops will remain an indefinite concern for the
45 health and welfare of residents and visitors in Colorado. For this
46 reason, we do intend to revisit this issue during the 2017 legislative
47 session to seek a more permanent funding solution for this important
48 program.

49

- 50 • **Footnote 42, page 117:** Department of Human Services, Office of Early
51 Childhood, Division of Community and Family Support, Early Childhood
52 Mental Health Services – It is the intent of the General Assembly that this
53 appropriation be used for the purpose of supporting early childhood mental
54 health specialists in each community mental health center.

55

1 Our administration agrees with the intent of this footnote, and the
2 Department of Human Services (DHS) will make every reasonable
3 effort to ensure that each community mental health center (CMHC) will
4 choose to employ early childhood mental health specialists. However,
5 because the State secures the services of CMHCs through a competitive
6 procurement process, we cannot guarantee that each CMHC will
7 respond satisfactorily to the procurement solicitations issued by DHS.
8

- 9 • **Footnote 49, page 114:** Department of Human Services, Behavioral Health
10 Services, Integrated Behavioral Health Services, Rural Co-occurring
11 Disorder Services – It is the intent of the General Assembly that this
12 appropriation be used for the purpose of providing a full continuum of co-
13 occurring behavioral health treatment services in southern Colorado and the
14 Arkansas Valley.
15

16 The Department of Human Services secures behavioral health treatment
17 services through a competitive procurement process. While DHS will
18 comply with the intent of this footnote, the Department cannot
19 guarantee that vendors will respond to its procurement solicitation with
20 satisfactory offers to provide acceptable services in the specified
21 geographical areas.
22

- 23 • **Footnote 80, page 211:** Department of Public Health and Environment,
24 Administration and Support, Administration, Leave Payouts – The
25 Department may use this line item for leave payouts for cash funded and
26 federal funded employees only.
27

28 This footnote administers the appropriation. The Department of Public
29 Health and Environment will observe existing State and federal rules in
30 the use of indirect cost recoveries for leave payouts, and will comply
31 with the intent of this footnote only when practicable.
32

- 33 • **Footnote 87, page 228:** Department of Public Safety, Division of Criminal
34 Justice, Community Corrections, Community Corrections Placements – It is
35 the intent of the General Assembly that the Intensive Residential Treatment
36 (IRT) bed allocation in the San Luis Valley should not be reduced below 36
37 beds for the Southern Central Colorado Region to ensure bed capacity for
38 this part of the state.
39

40 The Department of Public Safety (CDPS) secures intensive residential
41 treatment community corrections services through a competitive
42 procurement process. While CDPS will comply with the intent of this
43 footnote to the extent possible, the Department cannot guarantee that
44 vendors will be available to provide this quantity of satisfactory services
45 in the specified geographical areas.
46

47 As in recent years, we also remain concerned with the General Assembly's
48 inclusion of full-time equivalent positions (FTE) within the general
49 appropriations act. The Colorado Supreme Court's opinion in *Anderson v.*
50 *Lamm*, 195 Colo. 437, 579 P.2d 620 (1978) clearly states that "specific staffing
51 and resource allocation decisions" in a general appropriations bill are
52 unconstitutional. The Supreme Court affirmed this finding in *Colorado*
53 *General Assembly v. Owens*, 136 P.3d 262 (Colo. 2006). Further, it remains our
54 opinion that any predetermined prescription of FTE authorization limits the
55 ability of State agencies to make the most resource-effective use of
56 appropriations to accomplish critical performance objectives.

1 Therefore, Executive Branch agencies are instructed to manage their
2 appropriations within the scope of the dollars appropriated in H.B. 16-1405 and
3 without limitation by the bill's FTE authorizations.

4
5 *Closing Comments*

6 House Bill 16-1405 and its companion legislation culminate a difficult but
7 productive year of work for Colorado's budget planners. We would like to
8 express our gratitude for the work performed by the Joint Budget Committee
9 members, the Joint Budget Committee staff, the staff of the Office of State
10 Planning and Budgeting, and the scores of budget analysts throughout
11 Colorado's government, all of whose tireless efforts on behalf of Colorado are
12 sometimes overlooked.
